2020 Fantasy Camp Coaches

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Jerry Augustine was drafted by the Brewers in the 15th round of the 1974 amateur draft. Augie pitched his entire 10-year career for Milwaukee (1975-1984). In his career, Augie won 55 games, saved 11, struck out 348, with a 4.23 ERA in 944 innings pitched.

Jeff Cirillo was drafted by the Brewers in the 11th round of the 1991 amateur draft. The 14-year Major League veteran and two-time All-Star, spent eight seasons with the Brewers (1994-1999) and (2005-2006). With the Brewers, Jeff batted .307 and collected 1,000 hits.

Chuck Crim was drafted by the Brewers in the 17th round of the 1982 amateur draft. The 8-year major leaguer spent five seasons in Milwaukee. With the Brewers, he won 33 games, saved 42 games, had a 3.47 ERA, and in 1989, led the AL with 76 games played.

Tim Dillard was drafted by the Brewers in the 34th round of the 2002 amateur draft. He played parts of four seasons with the Brewers (2008-2009, 2011-2012), and won one game, struck out 62, with a 4.70 ERA. Currently, he plays for the Rangers' AAA Nashville Sounds.

For the returning campers, you will not believe this is the same clubhouse that you spent a week during winter in years past.

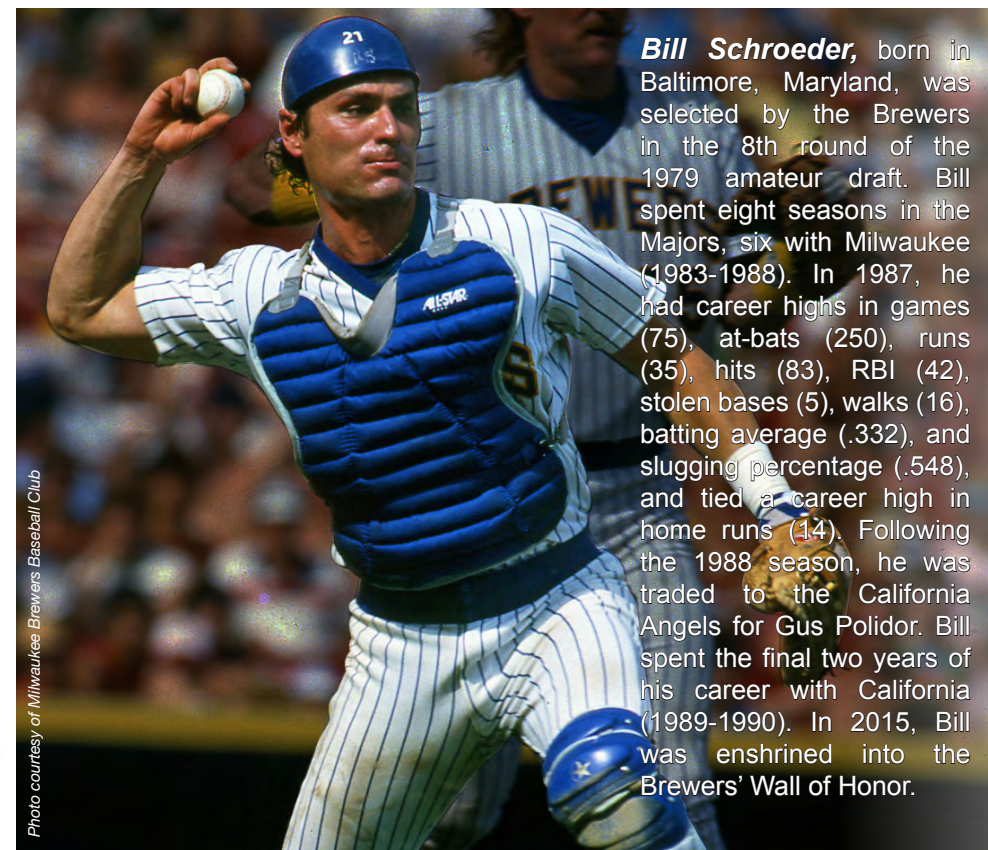
Before the 2020 Fantasy Camp, the

Bill Schroeder, born in Baltimore, Maryland, was selected by the Brewers in the 8th round of the 1979 amateur draft. Bill spent eight seasons in the Majors, six with Milwaukee (1983-1988). In 1987, he had career highs in games (75), at-bats (250), runs (35), hits (83), RBI (42), stolen bases (5), walks (16), batting average (.332), and slugging percentage (.548), and tied a career high in home runs (14). Following the 1988 season, he was traded to the California Angels for Gus Polidor. Bill spent the final two years of his career with California (1989-1990). In 2015, Bill was enshrined into the Brewers' Wall of Honor.



Jim Gantner was drafted by the Brewers in the 12th round of the 1974 amateur draft. "Gumbo" played his entire 17-year career (1976-1992) for his home state team, and had a lifetime BA of .274. He played in 1,801 games, amassed 1,696 hits, 47 home runs, and 568 RBI.



J.J. Hardy was drafted by the Brewers in the 2nd round of the 2001 amateur draft. The 13-year veteran and two-time All-Star ('07 & '13) spent five seasons at shortstop for Milwaukee (2005-2009). He batted .262, with 543 hits, 104 doubles, and belted 75 home runs with the Crew.



Corey Hart was drafted by the Brewers in the 11th round of the 2000 Draft. He spent 11 seasons in the majors, 9 with Milwaukee. With the Brewers, Corey batted .276, with 950 hits, 154 home runs, 508 RBI, and was on 2 All-Star teams (2008 and 2010).



Geoff Jenkins was drafted by the Brewers in the 1st round of the 1995 amateur draft. The 11-year veteran and one-time All-Star (2003) spent 10 seasons in Milwaukee (1998-2007). There he batted .277, and amassed 1,221 hits, 287 doubles, 212 home runs, and 704 RBI.



Scott Karl was drafted by the Brewers in the 6th round of the 1992 amateur draft. He spent five of his six ML years in Milwaukee (1995-1999). With the Brewers, he started 148 games, won 50, struck out 475 batters, and had a 4.57 ERA in 914.2 innings pitched.



Pete Ladd was acquired by the Brewers in October 23, 1981, via trade with the Houston Astros. The 6-year Big Leaguer spent 4 seasons with the Brewers (1982-1985). In Milwaukee, he won 8 games, saved 33, struck out 150, with a 4.32 ERA in 204 innings pitched.



Don Money was acquired by the Brewers on October 31, 1972 via trade with the Philadelphia Phillies. The 16-year veteran and 4-time All-Star ('74, '76-'78) spent 11 seasons (1973-1983) with the Brewers. He batted .270, with 1,168 hits, 134 home runs, and 529 RBI during his stay.



Ken Sanders was acquired by the Brewers on January 15, 1970 via trade with the Oakland A's. The 10-year veteran spent 3 seasons in Milwaukee (1970-1972). In 1971, he led the Majors with 83 games played, 77 games finished and 31 saves, & was named Reliever of the Year.



Ed Sedar has had many hats with the Brewers as he enters his 29th season with the organization: Minor League baserunning and outfield coordinator, manager of rookie league affiliates, and has coached first base and, since 2011, third base for the Brewers.



Jim Slaton was drafted by the Seattle Pilots in the 15th round of the 1969 amateur draft. The 1977 All-Star, spent 12 seasons with the Brewers (1971-1977, 1979-1983). In Milwaukee, he started in 268 games, won 117, with 69 complete games, in 2,025.1 innings pitched.



Rick Sweet has been involved in professional baseball for over 40 years. He spent 3 seasons in the majors (1978, 1982-1983) with the Padres, Mets, and Mariners. Since 2015, Rick's been managing the Brewers' AAA affiliate, now the San Antonio Missions.



Greg Vaughn was drafted by the Brewers in the 1st round of the 1986 June-Draft Secondary Phase. The 15-year veteran and 4-time All-Star ('93, '96, '98, '01) spent 8 seasons in Milwaukee (1989-1996), and batted .246, with 799 hits, 169 home runs, & 566 RBI.
