BALTIMORE BASEBALL CLUB OFFICERS'

JEROLD C. HOFFBERGER has been chairman of the board since October, 1965. In that span of nine seasons, the Orioles have won two world championships, four pennants and five eastern titles.

He was president of the National Brewing Company for 28 years (1947 to 1975) until last October when he became board chairman and chief executive officer of Carling National Breweries, Inc., formed by the consolidation of Carling O'Keefe Ltd. of Canada and the National Brewing Company. (National's participation in the merger involved only its brewing assets and did not include its stock in the Baltimore Orioles.)

In addition to his interest in the Carling National Breweries and the Baltimore Orioles, Mr. Hoffberger is Chairman of the Executive Committee of Fairchild Industries, a Director of the Maryland National Bank, the Motor Freight Express, and a number of other corporations. He is also a Director of the United States Brewers Foundation, and a member of its Executive Committee.

In November, Hoffberger was elected president of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds of North America. He is also currently a national Chairman of United Jewish Appeal and Chairman of the Distribution Committee of the Community Foundation of Baltimore. He is an officer and director of numerous other organizations including the boards of Johns Hopkins and Sinai Hospitals, Associated Jewish Charities and the Greater Baltimore Committees.

He was named "Man of the Year" in 1966 by the Advertising Club of Baltimore and "Outstanding Man of Industry" in 1971 by the Baltimore Jaycees.

Baltimore native . . . Educated at the University of Virginia . . . Served with the U.S. Army in World War II and achieved rank of captain . . . He and wife, Alice, have three boys and one girl . . . Ardent horseman and longtime breeder of thoroughbred horses.

ZANVYL KRIEGER, Treasurer and Chairman of the Executive Committee, was one of the principal figures in bringing the St. Louis Browns franchise to Baltimore in late 1953, and also played a primary role in re-establishing a professional football franchise in Baltimore earlier that year. He has been on the Orioles' board from the beginning and became treasurer in 1957. He has also served as a vice-president and director of the Baltimore Colts, and was board chairman of the Baltimore Clippers (America Hockey League) from their founding in 1962 to 1974.

Krieger, counsel to the law firm of Weinberg and Green, is a director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the John F. Kennedy Institute for Rehabilitation of Retarded Children, the National Jewish Hospital, the Greater Baltimore Committee and the Baltimore Promotion Council. He is also a trustee of Associated Jewish Charities and a member of the Baltimore City College Hall of Fame.

Krieger received an "Award of Merit" from Baltimore City in 1970 and was selected "Man of the Year" in 1968 by the National Jewish Hospital.

He is a Baltimore native and a graduate of Baltimore City College (1924), Johns Hopkins (1928) and Harvard Law School (1931) . . . He served four years in U.S. Army Air Force during World War II and was discharged with the rank of major . . . Prior to the war, he was assistant attorney general of Maryland for three years, during the tenure of Attorney General William C. Walsh . . . Krieger and his wife, Isabelle, are the parents of two daughters.

HENRY J. PETERS, a veteran of 29 years in professional baseball, officially replaced Frank Cashen as the Orioles' executive vice-president/general manager on November 3, 1975. Peters, 51, had been president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues for the past four years.

Before accepting the presidency of the National Association (the governing body of minor league baseball), in December, 1971, Peters had spent five years with the Cleveland Indians as vice-president and director of player personnel. Prior to that assignment, he had logged ten years with the Kansas City A's, and had also worked with the St. Louis Browns and Cincinnati Reds. In 1965, he had the distinction of being the last general manager ever appointed by A's owner Charlie Finley.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES

A St. Louis native, Peters broke into baseball in 1946, following three years with the U.S. Army in World War II during which he spent most of his duty in England, Germany, and Czechoslovakia. He started with the hometown Browns in the minor league department under Farm Director Jim McLaughlin (now the Orioles' coordinator of scouting and player development) and General Manager Bill DeWitt. When that franchise was sold and moved to Baltimore in October, 1953, Peters took a job as general manager of the independent Burlington, Iowa club in the Class B Three-I League.

After the 1954 season, he joined the new Kansas City A's organization as farm director and remained in that position through 1960. In early 1961, Peters left the A's, following a disagreement with Finley, and spent the balance of the year working, again for DeWitt, as farm director of the Cincinnati Reds (who won the N.L. pennant that season).

He returned to the A's in December, 1961, as assistant general manager and farm director and was appointed general manager in 1965. During his tenure in Kansas City such future stars as Jim "Catfish" Hunter, Bert Campaneris, Reggie Jackson, Sal Bando, Joe Rudi, Rick Monday, Gene Tenace, and Rollie Fingers were developed in the A's farm system.

Peters moved to Cleveland in 1966 and remained there until he was elected to succeed retiring National Association President Phil Piton. At that time, National Association headquarters were located in Columbus, Ohio, but in September, 1973, Peters relocated the office in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Hank and his wife, Dorothy, whom he met while both were working for the Browns, have been married for 25 years. They have two children: Sharon (20) and Steve (23), who is a general manager of the Midwest League club in Burlington, Iowa, where his dad preceded him 22 years ago.

J. FRANK CASHEN accepted the position of senior vice-president, marketing services of Carling National Breweries, Inc. in November, 1975. He had been executive vice-president of the Orioles since October, 1966 and general manager since October, 1971. Cashen remains as a vice-president of the ball club and a member of its board of directors.

JACK DUNN, Vice-President for Business Affairs, supervises stadium operations and concessions. A Baltimore native, he has been directly associated with professional baseball since his early youth. He is the grandson of the late Jack Dunn who owned and managed the International League Orioles to seven straight pennants from 1919 through 1925.

Dunn was president, general manager, part-time manager and a player for the pennant winning Centerville Orioles in the Eastern Shore League in 1946 . . . He served at various times as owner, president, general manager and manager of the International League Orioles before the Browns franchise was transferred to Baltimore in October, 1953.

Since then he has been traveling secretary, assistant to the general manager, public relations director, and play-by-play announcer, and became a vice president in 1965. He is the third largest Orioles stockholder.

A graduate of Boys Latin School and Princeton University, Dunn was a fighter pilot during World War II. He and his wife, Mary Rose, have two children: Jack IV and Barbara.

JOSEPH P. HAMPER, JR., Secretary and Vice-President for Financial Affairs, joined the Orioles in February, 1954, became controller in 1958, and was named a vice-president in 1966. He served as executive vice-president of the Baltimore Bays of the North American Soccer League, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Orioles, from 1967 through 1969.

A certified public accountant, Hamper has attended Johns Hopkins University. During World War II he served in the U.S. Infantry and spent three months as a prisoner of war in Germany. He is a bachelor.

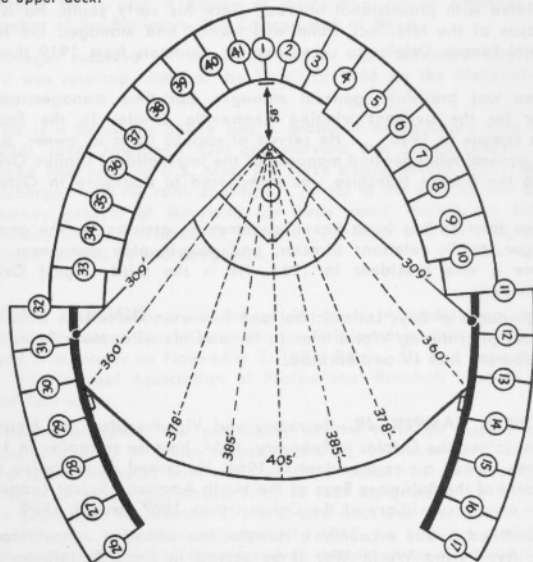

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FARM SYSTEM NOTES

TOP MINOR LEAGUE RECORD: In 1975, for the 14th consecutive season the Orioles' farm system compiled a composite winning record. The five clubs combined to post a 324-300 record (.519 pct.). During this stretch of 14 straight winning seasons (beginning 1962), Orioles' farm teams have compiled a percentage of .537 (5256-4540).

The Orioles have been chosen as the Topps "Baseball Organization of the Year" three times: 1966, 1971 and 1972. The winner of that annual award is determined by a formula that emphasizes the quality of individual prospects in a baseball system rather than team won-lost records.

NEW LOOK IN FARM SYSTEM: The Orioles' farm system has undergone a number of significant changes since last year:

(1) **Clyde Kluttz**, now in his 38th year in professional baseball as player, manager, scout and farm system administrator, has become director of player development. Kluttz, a former catcher who batted .268 during nine major league seasons before ending his playing career with the International League Orioles, in 1953, has spent the last nine years with the Yankees (starting 1967). Prior to that he worked with the A's for 14 years, 11 of them with the Orioles' new general manager, Hank Peters.

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FARM SYSTEM NOTES

(2) **Tom Giordano**, a long time associate of both Hank Peters and Clyde Kluttz dating back to his days as a player, manager and scout in the A's system, is the Orioles' new scouting director. Giordano, a 50-year old Newark, N. J. native, spent 12 years as an infielder and in 1953 played 11 games for the Philadelphia Athletics. Earlier that year he had the distinction of beating out Hank Aaron for the home run leadership of the Sally League.

Giordano has been scouting since 1960 (for the past three years with Montreal), and has had extensive experience as a minor league camp training coordinator and instructor. He has also served as supervisor of physical education and athletics for the Copiague, L. I., N. Y. public schools for the past seven years.

(3) **Asheville to Charlotte:** The Orioles will continue to operate in the AA Southern League in 1976, but in a new city. The Asheville franchise with which the Orioles have worked the past four years has been transferred to Charlotte where new owner Jim Crockett will operate the club. Charlotte has been without professional baseball since 1972, a year in which the Twins operated both a Southern League and a Carolina League (A) club there.

(4) **California League Association Terminated:** The Orioles will operate only one Class A club in 1976. The working agreement with Lodi in the California League was terminated at the end of last season.

(5) **Joe Ryan Buys Miami Franchise:** Joe Ryan, president of the American Association since 1972, has purchased the Miami club from the Orioles. Ryan is no stranger to the Baltimore organization. He was the general manager of the International League Miami Marlins, when that club maintained a working agreement with Baltimore in 1959 and 1960. Miami will be the only Class A team in the Orioles' organization in 1976.

(6) **Two Clubs in Appalachian:** In addition to owning and operating the Bluefield club, the Orioles will also supply approximately ten players to the Pulaski franchise in the Appalachian "Rookie" League. A number of other clubs including the Phillies, Dodgers and Cardinals will also provide players, but the Orioles will be responsible for administration and assigning a manager.

1975 FARM CLUB HIGHLIGHTS

Rochester (85-56, 2nd) finished the season in a first place tie with Tidewater, but lost a one-game tie-breaker, 8-0, to the Mets, then bowed to Syracuse in the first round of playoffs, three games to one. The Red Wings excelled in close games. They were 10-2 in extra innings, and were 57-35 (.620) in one and two-run games.

This was the 14th time in the 15 years that the Red Wings and Orioles have been working together (beginning 1961) that Rochester has qualified for post-season play. Manager Joe Altobelli came within one game of his fourth first place finish in five years at the Rochester helm. The Wings' home attendance (332,000) led the I.L. for the 14th time in the last 15 years.

Outfielder Royle Stillman, who was third in the league in hitting (.313), tied for first in doubles (24) and paced the Wings in rbi (75), was selected to the International League all-star team along with shortstop Bob Bailor (.293, 21 sb) and lefthander Mike Flanagan (13-6, 173 ip) who led the club in era (2.49), strikeouts (135), complete games (11) and shutouts (4). Stillman was also picked to the Topps AAA All-Star Team as chosen by National Association of Baseball Writers.

Though not picked, lefty Mike Willis with a 14-8 record tied for the loop lead in wins while outfielder Mike Reinbach (.290) and infielder Taylor Duncan (.288) ranked among the top hitters. Reinbach, incidentally, will play for the Hanshin Tigers (Osaka) in Japan's Central League in 1976. Paul Mitchell was recalled by the Orioles on June 30, after compiling a 10-1 record, and Dyar Miller was 5-0 with seven saves at the time of his recall on May 29th.

Asheville (63-75, 3rd tie), managed by Jim Schaffer, produced the Southern League's leading hitter in outfielder Chuck Heil (.322) who was the only Asheville player to win a berth on the league all-star team. First baseman Eddie Murray, a third-round choice in the June, 1973, draft, hit 17 home runs to share the Orioles' farm system leadership with Jim Fuller (Rochester) and Craig Ryan (Lodi) while batting .266 and driving in a team high 68 runs.

Creighton Tevlin, who played for the NCAA champion University of Southern California baseball team in 1974, batted .296 while U.S.C. teammate Rick Dauer, a first-round selection in the June, 1974, draft, hit .251.

Baltimorean Myrl Smith (Franklin High in Reisterstown) was 7-1 with six saves in 35 relief appearances, had a 1.46 era and struck out 66 in 74 innings.

Lodi (71-69, composite 4th) was 35-35 in the first half and 36-34 in the second under manager Bobby Malkmus. First baseman Craig Ryan, who was the Orioles' second round choice in June, 1974, but did not play at all that year because of a broken wrist, made his first season in pro ball an auspicious one. He led the organization in rbi (105), tied for the farm system lead in homers (17) and batted .308. Ryan was chosen to the California League all-star team as was Pitcher Greg Ward, a righthander, who was 8-3 with 81 strikeouts in 92 innings.

Miami (79-57, 1st Southern Div.) finished first in its division (by 13 games) for the sixth time in the last eight seasons, but lost to Tampa, two games-to-none in the first round of playoffs.

Three Miami players were named to the Florida State League all-star team: first baseman Tom Chism, who led the league in batting (.314); third baseman Marty Parrill, who topped the FSL in doubles (24) and rbi (75); and outfielder Don Whiting, a .279 hitter with 62 rbi. Another outfielder, Marshall Edwards, also batted .279 and topped the entire Baltimore organization in steals with 38.

Miami fashioned a staff era of 2.74. Among the club's mound standouts were: Nicaraguan righthander Tony Chevez (14-6, 3 svcs, 33 g, 18 gs, 8 cg, 2.08 era); righthander Bryn Smith (11-7, 2.14 era); righthander Randy Miller (8-5, 1.84 era) and another Nicaraguan, Dennis Martinez, with a 2.61 era, who was 12-4 for Miami and 4-1 for Asheville. His overall record of 16-5 made him the biggest winner in the Birds' farm system.

Bluefield (26-43, 4th Northern Div.), despite a last place finish, boasted three Appalachian League all-star selections: outfielder Bobby Glenn Smith, an undrafted free agent, who paced the league in batting (.363) and hits (94 in 68 games); third baseman Sheldon Draimin, a .324 hitter; and righthanded pitcher Dave Ford, who was the Orioles' number one pick in the June free agent draft of 1975 (3-3, 3.14). Juan Martinez, a second baseman from the Dominican Republic was not picked to the all-star team, but was one of the league's top hitters with a .325 average.

FARM SYSTEM MANAGERS

JOE ALTOBELLI, 43 (5/26/32), has managed Rochester to three first place finishes in five years and just missed a fourth in 1975. The Red Wings wound up in a tie for the top spot before a one-game playoff loss to Tidewater consigned them to second place.

A former first baseman who played 16½ pro seasons including brief stints with Cleveland ('55, '57) and Minnesota ('61), Altobelli has been managing in the Baltimore system since June, 1966.

In ten years from Bluefield (Appalachian "Rookie" League) to Rochester, he has won four pennants, three "manager of the year" awards (Appalachian in '67 and International in '71 and '74), and has finished below .500 only twice.

Joe has been associated with the Baltimore organization since going to Rochester as a player in 1963. He remained with the Red Wings over the last 3½ years of his playing career before retiring in mid-1966 to begin managing.

He won the Appalachian League pennant in 1967, then spent a year running the Stockton Club (Class A, California). In 1969 and 1970 he managed at Dallas-Ft. Worth (Class AA, Texas), finishing 2nd and 3rd respectively before returning to Rochester as manager in 1971.

In that first year at Triple-A, Altobelli's club including Bobby Grich and Don Baylor won the pennant, the International League playoffs and the Little World Series. The Red Wings dropped to fourth in 1972, but bounced back to win their division in 1973. In 1974 the club not only led the division but swept both rounds of playoffs to emerge as league champions on all fronts (there was no Little World Series that year).

Joe, who played in only 166 big league games, spent most of his career at the Triple-A level and enjoyed some impressive seasons. He led the International League in both home runs (31) and rbi (105) while playing for Montreal, in 1960, and in his last full season as a player batted .295 with 20 homers for Rochester (1965).

FARM SYSTEM NOTES (Cont.)

He broke into baseball in 1951 with Daytona Beach, a Cleveland farm club in the Florida State League where he still holds the record for longest hitting streak (36 games) and subsequently played for: Reading (1952-53) in the Eastern League; Indianapolis (1954-56, 1958) and Omaha (1962) in the American Association, and Columbus (1957), Toronto (1959), Montreal (1960), Syracuse (1961) and Rochester (1963-66) in the International League.

Joe, a native of Detroit, has lived in Rochester for many years with his wife, Pat, and their five children: Michael, Mark, Jody, Jackie and Jerry.

JIMMIE SCHAFFER, 39 (4/5/36,) will return to the Southern League for his fifth season as a manager in the Orioles' farm system. Last year he managed the Birds' farm club at Asheville and this season will operate out of Charlotte.

A veteran of 16 years as an outstanding defensive catcher in pro ball, Jimmie retired after playing at Rochester in 1970 and began his managing career in 1971 by winning a pennant in Bluefield and "manager of the year" award (Appalachian "Rookie" League) . . . For the next three years (1972-73-74), he managed the Lodi Orioles in the California League. In 1973, he won another "manager of the year" trophy after winning the California League championship in an unusual way. Lodi won the first half championship, but then dropped to seventh in the second half before rallying to defeat the Bakersfield Dodgers, who had finished first in the second half, in post-season playoffs, two games to none.

During his playing career he saw service in 304 major league games with six different clubs from 1961 thru 1968. He broke into the majors with the Cardinals and later played for the Cubs, White Sox, Mets, Phillies and Reds, and also served a tour of duty in the Dodgers' organization. In his first pro season at Decatur, in 1955, he once played all nine positions in a single game.

Jim makes his home in Coopersburg, N. Y. with his wife, Jeannine, and five children: Jimmie Mark, Steven, Thomas, Eric and Traci.

LEN JOHNSTON (Miami) is a newcomer to the Orioles' organization, but not to professional baseball or to Hank Peters for whom Johnston worked in the Cleveland farm system. Peters describes the new Miami Orioles' manager as "a very effective handler of young ballplayers, one of the most important qualities a successful minor league manager must have today."

The 47-year-old Western Michigan University alumnus played 16 seasons in the minors, 12 of them at the Triple-A level and also managed for eight years. A lefthanded hitting outfielder, Johnston was known for his speed and consistency rather than for his power. In 1,718 games, from 1952 to 1967, he batted .286; hit over .300 four times; once stole 64 bases in a season and amassed 71 lifetime triples, nearly three times his home run total (24).

Johnston, who played in the White Sox, Yankees, Phillies, and Reds systems, spent the last seven years of his career at Indianapolis in three different Triple-A leagues.

In 1967, he joined the Washington organization as playing manager at Burlington in the Class A Carolina League, and spent two seasons there, followed by a year as a coach at Buffalo in the International League.

He was hired by Peters, then the Indians' player personnel director, in 1970, as manager of the Sumter Club in the Western Carolinas League, and remained with the Cleveland organization as a scout and spring camp coordinator as well as a manager through 1973. In 1974, he managed a co-op team at Peninsula in the Carolina League, then stayed out of baseball last season except for a front office assignment with the Indianapolis Indians.

A native of Pontiac, Michigan, Johnston and his wife, Alice, have lived in Indianapolis since 1964. They are the parents of two sons: David and Danny.

BEN HINES, 38, a one time Orioles' farmhand and more recently a highly successful baseball coach at LaVerne College (LaVerne, California), will manage the Bluefield Orioles in the Appalachian Rookie League.

It was at Bluefield, 16 years ago (1960), that Hines made his minor league debut as a catcher-infielder by hitting a grand slam home run in his first professional plate appearance. He later played at Leesburg (Florida State) and Stockton (California League) before drawing his release in 1961.

A three-sport star (baseball, football, and basketball) as an undergraduate at LaVerne, Hines returned there in 1960 as head baseball coach, a position he held for 15 years (through 1974). In that period, he experienced only one losing season, in his first year, and went on to compile a won-lost percentage of .662 (392-202).

Under Hines' leadership LaVerne won the NAIA national championship following a 33-8 season in 1972. During his tenure there, Hines, who holds both a B.A. and an M.A. degree from the college, also served as an assistant football coach (defensive coordinator).

In addition to coaching at the college level, Hines spent several summers managing in top amateur leagues and in 1974 managed in the minors at Ogden, Utah in the Pioneer League.

Last summer he piloted the Boulder Collegians (Big Five College League) to the championship in the prestigious National Baseball Congress Tournament in Wichita, Kansas.

Hines has conducted countless coaching clinics and has written numerous articles on baseball fundamentals.

RAY MILLER, a 30-year old former relief pitcher, is in his third season as the Orioles' minor league pitching instructor. After serving at Rochester in 1973 as a pitcher-coach under Joe Altobelli, he moved into his present assignment when his predecessor, Herman Starrette, joined the Atlanta Braves as their major league pitching coach.

Ray joined the Baltimore organization during the 1971 season from the Cleveland farm system and in three years at Rochester appeared in 106 games, won 11, lost 8 and saved 18. He has been in organized baseball since 1964 when he broke in at Lexington in the Western Carolinas League. He pitched at the Triple-A level during his last six seasons as an active player.

A Tacoma Park, Md. native and a graduate of Suitland (Md.) High School, Ray lives with his wife, Judith, and son, Raymond, in New Athens, Ohio.

BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on April 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years. Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher.

The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b; Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, lf; Stephens, 3b; Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

GRAND SLAM NOTES: Jim Gentile set an American League record and tied a major league mark in '61 when he hit five home runs with the bases full. The major league record had been established by Ernie Banks in '55 . . . Gentile also set a major league standard by hitting consecutive bases loaded home runs at Metropolitan Stadium (Minnesota) on 5/9/61 in the 1st inning off Pete Ramos and the 3rd off Paul Giel . . . In addition, Gentile also had a run producing single in that game to set a club record for rbi in a game (nine).

Frank Robinson became the second player in history to hit consecutive grand slams on 6/26/70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington, in the 5th off Joe Coleman and 6th off Joe Grzenda. Since then, Jim Northrup (then with Detroit) duplicated that feat. Four other players (Lazzeri, Tabor, York and Cloninger) have hit two grand slams in a game, but they were not on consecutive plate appearances.

Brooks Robinson once blasted bases loaded homers in successive games—at Dodger Stadium off Angels' Ken McBride on 5/6/62 and at Memorial Stadium off the K.C. A's Ed Rakow on 5/9/62.

One of Dave McNally's two grand slams was hit in the '70 World Series, off the Reds' Wayne Granger (3rd game) . . . Dave's was the 12th grand slam in series history, but the only one ever hit by a pitcher . . . Mike Cuellar hit his grand slam in the '70 ALCS off the Twins Jim Perry in Met Stadium . . . Mike remains the only player ever to hit a bases loaded home run in championship series competition in either league.

Four opponents have hit two grand slams in Memorial Stadium: Roy Sievers (Wash.), Bill Skowron (N.Y.), Mike Epstein (Wash.) and Rico Petrolcelli (Bos.) . . . In all, opponents have hit 48 grand slams off Baltimore pitching including 24 in Memorial Stadium . . . Neither Harmon Killebrew nor Mickey Mantle has ever hit a grand slam against the O's although Killebrew has hit more home runs vs. O's than any other opponent as well as more in Memorial Stadium—67 (30) and Mantle ranks second with 54 (25).

Notes On 20-Game Winners

During the eight years that George Bamberger has been the Orioles' pitching coach (starting in '68), the Birds' staff has produced 15 20-game winning performances. In the club's first 14 years of operation only one pitcher was able to reach that plateau—Steve Barber in 1963.

In this period Jim Palmer has been a 20-game winner five times while Mike Cuellar and Dave McNally have reached that level four times each, and both Pat Dobson and Mike Torrez once each.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win level. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved that feat were four hurlers from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickie Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, incidentally, the White Sox that year finished second, two games back of Cleveland.

The four Orioles pitchers all reached the 20-win plateau within six days: McNally was first on 9/21, then in the same weekend series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24—1st game—clinched pennant), Dobson (9/24—2nd game), Palmer (9/26).

Elrod Hendricks was the last Oriole to hit into a triple play, in Boston on 5/25/72. Duane Josephson (1b) caught his line drive, stepped on first then threw to Luis Aparicio at second for the third out. . . . On four of the 10 occasions that Birds' opponents have executed triple plays, Brooks Robinson has been the batter. Brooks grounded into one, lined into another and two were "gidp's" with a runner then being thrown out between third and home.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field. . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge. . . . That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

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THE ORIOLES' 1975 REVIEW

A good case can be built around the 1975 Orioles to illustrate that old bromide "the games you win (or lose) in April and May are as important as the games in September."

Following a particularly impressive exhibition season (18-9), the Orioles creamed Detroit 10-0 in their opener, played "win one-lose one" for the next two weeks, lost six in a row, bounced back to .500 after winning the first game of a doubleheader against the Angels on May 16, then hit the skids.

The Orioles dropped 11 of their next 12 including seven straight out west from May 22 thru 28 (at Chicago, K.C. and Oakland). It was the longest losing streak since 1968 and when it ended the Birds were in the cellar, 7½ games back of division leading Boston. The worst club batting average in the league and a bullpen that was 1-9 with a 5.25 era were the principal culprits.

Though they weren't yet out of the woods, the truth is that from that point on the Orioles out-played every club in the majors but the Cincinnati Reds. . . . Over the last four months of the campaign, the O's were 74-43 (.632). Boston was 73-48 (.603), Oakland 71-47 (.602) and the Reds 81-34 (.704). Good, but not good enough.

The improvement that followed was steady, if not dramatic. From the end of the disastrous stretch of 11 defeats in 12 tries, the Orioles were 25-18 to the all-star break. They had moved up to 4th but dropped to 8 games back of the Sox.

The three-day respite (and, it was that for all but one, since only Jim Palmer was selected to the all-star squad and he didn't pitch) apparently breathed new life into the ballclub. The O's went 21-7 during the first 3½ weeks following the intermission (thru August 9).

During that period the O's won three of four from Oakland (after having lost seven of the first eight to the A's), seven of eight from the Brewers and enjoyed a 7-1 road trip (8/4 thru 8/10) which started with the sweep of a two-game series at Fenway. Strangely, it was during this hot spell that the Birds dropped almost out of sight of the Red Sox. On August 3rd, they trailed by 9½ games.

As stated earlier, the Birds played better than everybody but the Reds after May 28th. Well, after the all-star game, they played better than anybody period. The Orioles were 49-25 (.662), the Red Sox 45-28 (.616), the A's 43-32 (.573) and the Reds 47-25 (.653). Again, however, it wasn't better "enough."

The rest of the year provided a series of frustrations, but each time until the pennant race ended on Saturday, September 27th, the Birds kept bouncing back. When Boston came to Baltimore on the last visit, the O's were back by six and needed at least a split, so everyone said. Instead they dropped both games and trailed by eight. But the O's came off the floor and had won 10 of 12 when they went to Boston for the last time, behind now by only four games.

A two-game sweep was again in order but again, thanks largely to Luis Tiant in the first game (9/16), it wasn't to be. The O's won the second game to gain a split, then built a five-game winning streak to whittle the Red Sox' lead to 3½ games as the final week began.

An incredible week-long rainfall dominated the east during that period raising hell with the schedule. The Birds played one of three with Detroit (on Wednesday, the 24th) and the other two were tentatively scheduled for the next week along with a previously unplayed home game with Chicago. In the meantime, the Red Sox were rained out of two with the Yankees, thus missing Catfish and May. Those two were to be made up also the next week if necessity dictated.

The O's went to New York Friday for a doubleheader that was rained out and were then faced with back-to-back twin bills the next two days. On Saturday, "Catfish" and Doc Medich made Sunday's games academic. It was the only doubleheader the O's were to lose all year.

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THE ORIOLES' 1975 SEASON

PITCHING: The Orioles led the A.L. in pitching for the 6th time in the last seven years with a team era of 3.17, finishing ahead of Oakland (3.27) and New York (3.29). . . . It was the 9th time in 22 seasons (since '54) that the O's had won the pitching title and the 14th time they have wound up first or second. . . . Not since 1967 has Baltimore ranked lower than second in era.

The O's also tied for the league lead in complete games (70) with the Yankees and, thanks largely to Jim Palmer's major league leading 10 shutouts, tied the Angels for the loop lead in that category (19).

FIELDING: The Birds led the league in fielding for the second year in a row with a .983 percentage, well ahead of the second place clubs—Cleveland, Chicago and New York—all of which compiled .978 averages. The Birds have finished first ('63, '64, '66, '69, '74, '75) or second in fielding ('60, '61, '68, '70, '71, '72, '73) in each of the last eight years and 13 times in the past 16 seasons. They have not finished lower than second since 1967. Baltimore also paced the league in double plays with 175 in 1975 and tied an A.L. record by completing 36 double plays (including at least one in each game) over a span of 17 games from June 9 thru June 26, 1975 (Angels set record in 1963).

Brooks Robinson had the highest fielding average among the league's third basemen for the 11th time in his career (.979), and Ross Grimsley paced A.L. pitchers with no errors in 39 chances.

For the fifth time in seven seasons, the Orioles had four Gold Glove winners—Brooks Robinson, Paul Blair, Mark Belanger and Bobby Grich. . . . See page 45 for further details. . . . For Orioles A.L. and M.L. individual fielding records, see page 17.

BATTING: The Orioles finished with a respectable final average of .252 and ranked 9th ahead of Milwaukee (.250), Detroit (.249) and California (.246). This was a vast improvement over what might have been. For a period of about 10 weeks from late May thru early August, the Birds were 12th and last with an average that plummeted as low as .232 on June 1st, right after Nolan Ryan's no-hitter.

The Orioles, however, led the league in designated hitting with a .278 average and were sixth in home runs (124).

1975 HIGHLIGHTS ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

BOSTON: The Orioles were 9-9 against the Red Sox, winning six of nine in Boston but only three of nine in Baltimore.

May Day: Lee May walked into cozy Fenway Park for the first time in his life, April 18, looked around and promptly unloaded two home runs and drove in seven runs to spark the O's to a 9-7 victory . . . He hit both homers off Reggie Cleveland and both were with two runners aboard.

Doubles: Catcher Dave Duncan tied three records when he had four consecutive doubles against the Red Sox at Fenway in the second game of a June 30 doubleheader . . . He tied major league records for the most doubles in a game and the most consecutive doubles, and he also tied a club record for the most two-base hits in a game.

Baylor Binge: Don Baylor tied two club records—for the most hits and runs scored in a game—when he went 5-for-5 and scored four times to pace the Orioles to a 12-8 win at Fenway, August 4 . . . The contest perfectly fitted the definition of "a typical Fenway Park game" . . . The Red Sox got five in the third inning to take a 6-1 lead, but the O's tied it with four in the fifth and then grabbed the lead with four in the seventh.

Pole Cracked: A line drive off the bat of Tony Muser struck Red Sox pitcher Dick Pole in the face during the first game of a twin-bill at Fenway Park, June 30 . . . Pole suffered a broken cheekbone and spent several weeks on the disabled list.

Pitching Parade: The O's and Red Sox tied a league record by using seven pitchers in the ninth inning, June 20, at Memorial Stadium . . . The Orioles used four but the moves only temporarily staved off defeat because Boston scored once in the 12th to win by a 4-3 score.

Base Path Charade: Carl Yastrzemi caused one of the most confusing moments of the year on the bases at Memorial Stadium, September 4 . . . There was one out with Yaz at second and Fred Lynn at first when a ground ball was hit to third baseman Brooks Robinson . . . Robinson stepped on the bag to force Yastrzemi, then got off a low throw in a hurried effort to complete a doubleplay at first . . . The throw got by first baseman Lee May.

Yastrzemi, despite the fact he was out, rounded third base and continued down the line toward the plate at a half-run . . . May retrieved the ball, saw what he thought was a runner (Yastrzemi) trying to score and fired the ball to the plate . . . May's throw, however,

skipped past catcher Dave Duncan as Yaz crossed the plate . . . To further confuse the situation, home plate umpire Larry Barnett signaled Yastrzemi safe . . . Lynn scored on May's errant throw.

Good Gates: In 16 dates the Orioles and Red Sox drew a combined total of 398,948 fans . . . The two clubs attracted 219,097 in eight dates at Fenway Park and 179,948 in eight dates at Memorial Stadium . . . Seven dates, including five in Boston, drew more than 30,000.

Early Overtime: The two clubs played 12 innings on Opening Day in Baltimore (April 11) before Yastrzemi homered to give the Red Sox a 6-5 victory before a turnout of 38,687 . . . The next day's game went 13 innings before the Red Sox won again.

CALIFORNIA: The Orioles split the series for the year against the Angels, going 2-4 in Baltimore and 4-2 in Anaheim . . . Five of the games were shutouts, including four by 1-0 scores.

Near-Miss: Southpaw Mike Cuellar, who has experienced great success against the Angels in his career, hurled a one-hitter against California the night before Ryan pitched his no-hitter . . . Cuellar stopped the Angels on one hit—a fourth-inning single by Bruce Bochte—at Anaheim Stadium, May 31 . . . The winning margin for Cuellar came on an eighth-inning homer by Brooks Robinson, the game's only run.

Record Gate: A crowd of 48,042, largest regular-season turnout in the club's history, saw the Orioles lose to the Angels, May 17, at Memorial Stadium . . . The huge throng was attracted by Jacket Night and saw an on-field rarity—an umpire change his decision.

Third base umpire Ron Luciano, in the fifth inning, signaled home run on a drive down the leftfield line by Tommy Harper, with two runners aboard . . . After the Orioles and Manager Earl Weaver disputed the call, the umpires met in conference and Luciano then changed his call to foul ball . . . Angels' skipper Dick Williams was ejected for his performance after he saw Luciano change his call.

Luciano admitted after the game he never saw the ball, but felt he had to make a call. "I had a 50-50 chance of being right," he said.

Steal Mark: The Orioles tied a club record with five stolen bases, May 30, against the Angels . . . Don Baylor and Bob Grich had two and Lee May had one.

Mass Ejection: No less than four members of the Orioles were tossed out of a game in Anaheim, July 8 . . . Home Plate Umpire Jim Evans banished Manager Earl Weaver, coaches Bill Hunter and Jim Frey, and designated hitter Tommy Davis.

CHICAGO: The Orioles won the season series from the White Sox, seven games to four, with one cancellation . . . The O's were 4-1 at home against the White Sox and 3-3 in Chicago.

Kaat Stopped: The O's put an end to Jim Kaat's 12-game winning streak when they beat the veteran lefty, 3-2, May 13 . . . The streak, longest in White Sox history, had been compiled by Kaat over a two-year period.

Prime Beef: A controversial home run call by umpire Armando Rodriguez at White Sox Park, August 10, quickly moved the O's from likely winners to definite losers . . . The O's had a 2-0 lead into the ninth inning when a drive to left-centerfield by Brian Downing was ruled a home run by second base umpire Rodriguez . . . Downing's liner, with one runner aboard, hit at the top of the fence and bounded straight down onto the field . . . The White Sox quickly scored another run to win, 3-2 . . . The loss was the only one for the O's on an eight-game trip.

First 20: Jim Palmer became 1975's first 20-game winner in the majors when he defeated the White Sox, 4-2, in Baltimore, August 30.

CLEVELAND: The Orioles were 10-8 against the Indians, posting a 4-4 record in Baltimore and 6-4 record in Cleveland . . . As a result of a postponed Labor Day doubleheader, one game was shifted from Baltimore to Cleveland . . . The clubs played four doubleheaders and split all of them.

Initial Save: The O's relief staff did not record its first save of the

season until June 16, when Grant Jackson earned one against the Indians . . . It came in the O's 58th game of the season.

Big Outburst: The O's had 19 hits—their best one-game production of the year—while romping over the Indians, 13-6, on June 18.

Rally: The Orioles were on the verge of a doubleheader loss to the Indians, April 26, when they won the nightcap with a last-ditch rally in the ninth inning . . . The O's were down 2-1 with two outs in the ninth when they put together four straight hits for two runs and a 3-2 victory . . . Gaylord Perry had won the opener, 3-0.

End of Streak: With a victory over the Indians in the first game of a May 4 twin-bill, the Orioles snapped a seven-game losing streak—the longest for the club since 1968 and also the longest in Earl Weaver's tenure as manager.

DETROIT: The Orioles defeated the Tigers 12 times in 16 games, with two games cancelled . . . The Orioles were 4-3 at Memorial Stadium and 8-1 at Tiger Stadium . . . Between June 27 and the end of the season the Orioles won 11 of 12 from Detroit, including seven in a row at one point.

Baylor's Year: Don Baylor turned out to be a one-man destruction crew against the Tigers . . . He batted .400 with 24-for-60 and had six home runs and 19 runs batted in . . . In nine games at Tiger Stadium he hit .514 (18-for-35) with four homers and 15 rbi.

He became the fifth player in O's history to hit three homers in a game when he did it July 2 at Tiger Stadium . . . Coupled with a homer he hit in his last official at-bat the night before in Boston, he tied an American League record for the most consecutive home runs in two games.

He had four hits Opening Day (April 10) at Tiger Stadium and four safeties in the nightcap of an August 6 doubleheader, also at Tiger Stadium.

Late Start: Weather, which caused two games late in the season to be cancelled, also was responsible for a delayed opening of the season . . . The clubs were to start the season April 8 in Detroit, but snow and cold weather pushed the opener back two days . . . The O's won the opening game easily, 10-0, as Jim Palmer pitched a three-hitter and Lee May, in his first official plate appearance for the O's, clubbed a three-run homer into the left field upper deck at Tiger Stadium.

Long Wait: When Doyle Alexander blanked the Tigers, 8-0, September 13, it was his first shutout in three years . . . His last previous one had been September 9, 1972, against Milwaukee.

KANSAS CITY: The Orioles were 7-5 vs. the Royals, compiling a 5-1 record in Baltimore and a 2-4 record in Kansas City.

His Last?: Harmon Killebrew, added by the Royals as a designated hitter for the 1975 season, played the role perfectly against the O's, May 23 . . . He hit two home runs to pace the Royals to a 10-1 win . . . The two homers boosted Killebrew's career total to 68 against the Orioles, the most ever hit by an opposing player against the O's.

Jim's Dandy: A fourth-inning single by Hal McRae was the only hit given up by Jim Palmer when he beat the Royals, 1-0, June 8 . . . McRae's hit came with two outs . . . The one-hitter was Palmer's third in his career.

Ignores Delay: A rain delay in the second inning, that lasted two hours and eight minutes, had no impact on Jim Palmer, August 13, at Memorial Stadium . . . He went the distance and blanked the Royals on two hits, 3-0.

Late Win: The Royals scored four runs in the ninth inning to beat the Orioles 5-4, May 24 . . . Mike Torrez, although he was not the loser, had a three-hit shutout through seven frames.

MILWAUKEE: The Orioles won 14 of 18 from the Brewers, posting 7-2 records home and away . . . The O's are 72-33 (.686) against the Brewers since the club was established in Seattle in 1969 . . . Since the Brewers moved to Milwaukee in 1970, the Orioles have won 34 of 48 games (.708) at County Stadium . . . The Orioles won 11 of the final 12 games from the Brewers, including the last five in succession.

Double Milestones: Tommy Davis passed two significant points in his career during a five-game series at Milwaukee, July 24-27 . . . He

drove in the 1,000th run of his career, July 24, and collected his 2,000th career hit in the first game of a doubleheader, July 27.

One Hit: Mike Cuellar beat the Brewers, 4-0, on a one-hitter July 26 . . . The only safely off him was a single by George Scott leading off the seventh inning . . . The one-hitter was Cuellar's second of the season and fourth of his career . . . He pitched one against California, May 31.

Great Comeback: In one of the most stirring comebacks in the club's history, the Orioles scored six runs in the ninth inning to tie the game and five in the 10th to beat the Brewers, 11-6, in the second game of a doubleheader, July 27 . . . The O's scored all six of their runs in the ninth before a batter was retired and the game-tying blow was a three-run homer by Al Bumbry . . . In the 10th, Ken Singleton broke the tie with a run-scoring single and Tommy Davis, a few moments later, belted a grand-slam home run . . . Five days later in Baltimore (August 1), Davis crashed another grand-slam against the Brewers.

First Time: Righthander Mike Torrez became a 20-game winner for the first time in his career when he beat the Brewers, 3-0, on a two-hitter, September 21.

MINNESOTA: The Orioles and Twins split the series for the year, 6-6 . . . The O's won four of six in Baltimore and the Twins did the same in Minnesota.

Timely Blow: A three-run homer by Ellie Hendricks in the 12th inning gave the Orioles a 6-3 victory, July 17, at Memorial Stadium.

Biggest Inning: The O's had their biggest inning of the year when they scored eight runs in the fourth en route to a 9-6 victory over the Twins, July 18 . . . Hendricks, improving his feat of the night before, struck the major blow in the inning—a grand slam homer.

Bruised: O's first baseman Lee May suffered a bruised left wrist when he was hit by a pitch from Dave Goltz, August 18, at Metropolitan Stadium . . . The injury caused May to miss five games, a notable fact when considering he ended the season with 99 runs batted in.

Two Belts: Bob Grich hammered two home runs against the Twins to spark the O's to a 9-3 victory in Baltimore in the nightcap of a twin-bill, May 11 . . . The next time the two clubs met, June 13 in Minnesota, Eric Soderholm hit a pair of homers to lead the Twins to a 7-3 victory.

NEW YORK: The Orioles lost the season series to the Yankees, 10 games to eight . . . The O's were 5-4 at home but only 3-6 in the Yanks' temporary home at Shea Stadium.

Standoff: Jim Palmer and Catfish Hunter, winners of the Cy Young Award in the American League the past three years, faced each other four times during the year and came out even . . . Palmer beat Hunter, May 5 (3-1) and September 4 (5-4), while Hunter beat Palmer, May 1 (5-0) and September 7 (2-0). However, Hunter also defeated Mike Torrez on June 24 (3-1) and September 27 (3-2) to finish at 4-2 vs. Baltimore.

Hunter's Moment: Catfish Hunter got his 20th win of the year, September 7, when he beat the Orioles, 2-0 . . . It was his fifth straight 20-victory season and it put him in an elite class with Walter Johnson and Lefty Grove as the only pitchers in AL history to achieve the feat.

Near Brawl: Catcher Thurman Munson livened up the O's-Yankees game at Memorial Stadium, June 24, when he charged Mike Torrez on the mound in the third inning . . . Munson was hit by a Torrez pitch in the second inning and went for Torrez after grounding out in the third . . . It was a typical baseball tussle as both benches emptied and there was lots of pushing and shoving but no blows landed . . . In the O's half of the second inning, catcher Ellie Hendricks was hit by a Catfish Hunter pitch and Bob Grich was nicked by a Hunter pitch in the seventh, which resulted in a warning to both managers by home plate umpire Nick Bremigan.

Wild Game: The O's went 13 innings, September 6, to beat the Yankees, 7-6, in a game in which there were 24 hits, four errors, four unearned runs and three ejections . . . The O's tied the game in the ninth inning on an unearned run when catcher Rick Dempsey and first baseman Chris Chambliss collided on a pop fly between home and first base with two outs . . . Tossed out of the game were both managers, Earl Weaver and Billy Martin, along with Thurman Munson . . . Grant

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Jackson pitched great in relief for the O's, giving up no hits and striking out seven in 4.1 innings . . . Don Baylor drove in the winning run with a one-out single.

Eliminated: The Orioles were eliminated from the AL East race on September 27, when they lost a doubleheader to the Yankees at Shea Stadium, their first and only twin-bill loss of the year. It was the next to the last day of the season.

OAKLAND: The Orioles finished with a 4-8 record against the A's . . . The O's held their own at home, splitting six games, but lost five of six in Oakland.

Huge Crowd: A Family Night crowd of 42,358 in Oakland watched the A's beat the Orioles, 6-5, in 11 innings, May 26 . . . It was the largest crowd of the season to see the O's on the road.

Perry's Show: Veteran Jim Perry had only a 4-10 combined record with Cleveland and Oakland in 1975, but two of his wins for the A's were eye-poppers against the Orioles . . . He stopped the O's on a one-hitter, June 10, a lead-off single by Al Bumbry in the sixth inning, and he beat Jim Palmer, 7-1, on a three-hitter on July 12.

Rare Appearance: Jim Palmer made his first relief appearance in two years in the nightcap of a doubleheader on July 19 . . . He induced Sal Bando to hit into a game-ending doubleplay to preserve an O's win and earn a save for Ross Grimsley, the second of his career.

Longest Game: The O's, in their longest game of the year, battled the A's for 15 innings before losing, 4-3, June 9, at Memorial Stadium . . . A disputed home run by Campy Campaneris in the eighth inning tied the game, 3-3 . . . O's Manager Earl Weaver objected to umpire Nick Bremigan's call and was thrown out of the game . . . The game consumed four hours and 38 minutes, which also made it the longest of the season from a time standpoint.

Rollie's Run: When A's relief ace Rollie Fingers pitched four scoreless innings against the O's, July 20, it extended his runless streak against the Orioles to two years . . . He last gave up a regular-season run to the O's on April 26, 1974 . . . Since then, he has faced them 10 times, pitching 21 innings . . . The O's did score a run off him in the 1974 ALCS.

TEXAS: The Orioles were 7-5 vs. the Rangers, splitting the series (3-3) at home and winning four of six in Arlington.

Two Times: Jim Palmer twice pitched beyond the normal regulation distance against the Rangers without winning . . . He worked 10.2 innings at Memorial Stadium, June 4, but had to leave the game after getting hit on the pitching hand by a line drive off the bat of Mike Hargrove . . . On August 21, Palmer pitched 12 innings in Arlington in a game that was eventually won by the O's in 14 frames.

See-Saw Tilt: The Rangers beat the Orioles, 10-6, at Memorial Stadium in the first game of an August 15 doubleheader . . . What made the game unusual was that the Rangers were ahead 6-0 early but the O's rebounded to tie the score in the seventh, only to have the Rangers score four in the eighth . . . Both managers, Earl Weaver and Frank Luchessi, were thrown out during the game.

Quick Thumb: Earl Weaver tied a major league record for the quickest ejection in the history of the game when he got tossed out on the second game, August 15, before it started . . . Weaver was chased during the line-up exchange meeting at the plate . . . Rookie Doug DeCinces keyed a 13-1 win in the nightcap with five runs batted in.

Disputed Ending: The Orioles dropped an 8-7 verdict to the Rangers, August 24, in a game that ended on a hotly controversial note . . . With the score tied, the Rangers had the bases loaded with one out when Mike Hargrove hit a grounder to O's shortstop Tim Nordbrook . . . Nordbrook's throw to the plate for the force-out appeared to be in time but home plate umpire Jerry Neudecker called runner Lenny Randle safe, ending the game . . . The Orioles, incensed at the call, blocked the runway from the field to the umpires' quarters for several minutes while disputing the decision.

Family Pride: Dave Duncan, a native of Dallas, gave members of his family something to cheer about when he hit two home runs at Arlington Stadium, June 11, to highlight a 9-8 victory for the Orioles.

ALL STAR GAME NOTES

Elected Starters: Selection of the starting team (excepting pitchers) was returned to the fans in 1970 under the sponsorship of the Gillette Co. in cooperation with Major League Baseball. Following the ballot box "stuffing" incident in Cincinnati in 1957, selection of the starting teams had been entrusted to major league players for 12 years ('58 thru '69).

Three Orioles have been chosen by fans to start in the all star game: Boog Powell ('70, '71), Brooks Robinson ('71, '72, '73, '74) and Frank Robinson ('70, '71). . . . In 1975 a record 7.3 million computerized ballots were cast in the All Star election.

Orioles MVPs: Three Orioles have won "mvp" honors in all star competition: Billy O'Dell (1958), Brooks Robinson (1966) and Frank Robinson (1971). O'Dell, the former Orioles lefthander who also pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last three innings of the only all star game ever played in Baltimore, and retired all nine batters he faced to protect a one-run lead, thus giving the A.L. a 4-3 win. . . . Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored. . . . Frank's fourth inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the American League on top to stay and earned him "mvp" honors. It was the A.L.'s first all star victory since 1962.

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ORIOLES SET A.L. RECORDS FOR CONSECUTIVE SHUTOUTS (5) AND CONSECUTIVE SCORELESS INNINGS (54)

The Orioles pitching staff set two A.L. records in early September, 1974 by putting together a string of five straight shutouts and by blanking their opponents over a stretch of 54 consecutive innings. The scoreless streak actually started in the 9th inning of a game in Kansas City on September 1. Dave McNally gave up his only run in the 8th and then pitched a scoreless 9th while beating the Royals, 7-1. The streak ended six games later in the 9th inning on September 7 when Ross Grimsley working on a 3-0 lead gave up a two-run home run to Cleveland's Charlie Spikes. Grimsley who was the winner anyway by a 3-2 score was relieved at that point by Bob Reynolds. That also ended another string, of six straight complete games, but extended the Birds' winning streak to 10.

During the 54 inning skein the O's out-scored their opponents, 14-0, and out-hit them 37-20 . . . Mike Cuellar won two of the five straight shutouts, both by 1-0.

The major league records of six straight shutouts and 56 consecutive innings which the O's came very close to at least tying were set by the 1903 Pirates (June 1 thru 9). The previous A.L. record of 47 consecutive innings was held by the 1948 Cleveland Indians and the mark of four consecutive shutouts had been accomplished four times, most recently by the Orioles' foursome of Hal Brown, Billy Loes, Connie Johnson, and Ray Moore between June 24 and 28, 1957.

Notes: The "Gold Glove" awards have been presented annually since 1957 by *The Sporting News* in cooperation with the Rawlings Sporting Goods Company to those players adjudged to be the best at their respective defensive positions by vote of league managers and coaches, TSN correspondents in each league city plus one play-by-play announcer from each league city. Selection is based not only on consistency (i.e. fielding percentage), but on overall ability and effectiveness.

Last year the Orioles earned four Gold Gloves for the fifth time in seven seasons. Only three other clubs have won as many as four in a season—The Cincinnati Reds twice (1974-1975) and the Chicago White Sox (1960) and St. Louis Cardinals (1963), once each.

The Orioles have won 37 Gold Gloves (including 25 in the last seven years), more than any other major league club. The Cardinals rank second with 31 and the Reds third with 28.

In 1975 Brooks Robinson won his 16th straight Gold Glove, Paul Blair his seventh straight and eighth in nine years, Mark Belanger his fifth and Bobby Grich his third.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4 1/2 to 5 innings).

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8.

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969. Formerly, the game would have been declared a tie and replayed in its entirety at a later date.

BALTIMORE CURFEW: Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13) —Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

In other American League cities not governed by local curfews, no inning may start after 1:00 A.M., but any inning beginning prior to 1:00 A.M. may be played to completion.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPIONSHIP QUALIFICATION: 502 or more plate appearances/162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (opening day thru Aug. 31) excluding time in military service.

NEW SAVE RULE (10:20): Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the finishing but not the winning pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions—(1) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning; or (2) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base or at bat, or on deck; or (3) he pitches effectively for at least three innings regardless of his team's lead.

DEFINITION OF NIGHT GAME: Any game scheduled to start after 6:00 P.M. (i.e. 6:01 P.M. or later) will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6:00 P.M. and is delayed by rain or for any other reason, it will be considered a day game.

However, both games of a two-night doubleheader shall be considered night games. When afternoon and night games are played on the same date and separate admissions are charged, they will be counted as one day and one night game, and will not be included in doubleheader statistics.

MAJOR ORIOLES WORLD SERIES RECORDS

Individual

Jim Palmer ranks as the youngest player ever to pitch a world series (ws) shutout. He was 20 yrs., 11 mos. and 21 days old when he blanked Sandy Koufax, 6-0, in 2nd game, 1966. Jim also holds record for receiving most bases loaded walks in one game (2, 2nd gm., 1971).

Brooks Robinson holds record for most total bases, 5-game series (17 in 1970) while he and Paul Blair, plus 6 others, are tied for most hits, 5-game series (9 in 1970). Brooks (1966) and Don Buford (1969) are two of 13 who have homered on their first ws at bat. Brooks is also one of five to have reached safely five times in a 9-inning game, batting 1.000 (3 hits, 2 walks, 2nd gm., 1971) and is one of 35 to have had four hits in one game (4th gm., 1970). No one has ever had more.

Dave McNally is the only pitcher ever to hit a ws grand slam (gm. 3, 1970) and one of only 12 players to have hit a slam in ws play. He is tied with Bob Gibson for most homers, total series (2, 1969 & 1970).

Moe Drabowsky set two records in the 1966 opener—most strikeouts by a relief pitcher (11 in 6.2 innings) and most consecutive strikeouts in a game (6).

Merv Rettenmund is among 16 to have hit safely twice in one inning (2nd gm., 1971) and is one of nine to have played three positions in a series (1971). Boog Powell (and Lee May) scored six runs in 1970 to tie the mark for most runs in a 5-game series.

Club

Orioles pitchers hold the ws record for most consecutive shutout innings, one series (33 in 1966) and most consecutive shutout innings, total series (39, 1966 & 1969) . . . They are tied for most consecutive shutouts pitched, one series (3, 1966) and for fewest players used in a 4-game series (13 in 1966).

The Birds hold the record for most homers (10), most total bases (87) and highest slugging pct. (.509), all for a 5-game series (1970). They also hold records for lowest batting average (.146) and fewest hits (23) in a 5-game series (both 1969) and for lowest batting average by a ws winner, 4-game series (.200 in 1966).

The O's were also responsible for several marks in a 4-game series set by the Dodgers in 1966. Among these are fewest hits (17), fewest runs (2), fewest total bases (23) and lowest batting average (.142).

The club has a share of the record for most batters hit by pitch in one game (3, gm. 4, 1971) and most consecutive homers, inning (2, 1st inn., 1st gm., 1966, by Frank and Brooks Robinson). This is a feat that has been performed seven times in ws history.

Fielding

The Orioles hold the record for highest fielding average in a 4-game series (1.000, 1966) as does Dave Johnson at second base for having accepted 24 chances in 1966 without error. Frank Robinson is tied for most putouts by a right fielder in one game (7, gm. 5, 1971) while Mark Belanger holds a share of the mark for most assists by a shortstop, inning (3, gm. 6, 1971) and Brooks Robinson for most double plays in a 5-game series by a third baseman (2, 1970).

Full season sponsors of Orioles' play-by-play broadcasts are: Carling National Breweries, Inc.; RPS Auto Parts; The Equitable Trust Company; Baltimore Buick Dealers Association and General Motors/Buick Division; and the Maryland State Lottery Agency.

Television—WJZ (Ch. 13) will carry 52 games, nine at home and 43 on the road, including the March 20 exhibition game vs. the Pittsburgh Pirates, the first baseball game to be played in the New Orleans Superdome.

In addition to Carling National, Amoco, Ezrine Auto Centers, The Tasty Baking Company, Fox Chevrolet, and the Maryland State Lottery Agency will co-sponsor all Orioles game telecasts.

EARL WEAVER

Born: Aug. 14, '30; 5'8"; 165; Batted, R; Threw, R.

Born in St. Louis, Mo. but now makes home in Baltimore . . . Has managed Orioles to three American League pennants, five eastern division titles and one world championship in seven full years on the job.

The Orioles have compiled 724-477 record since he was named manager July 11, 1968 succeeding Hank Bauer. His major league won-lost percentage of .60283 ranks second in baseball history behind Joe McCarthy (.617, 2126-1335) among managers with five or more years service. Cincinnati's Sparky Anderson is a close third with a percentage of .60269 (581-383).

His club's total of 318 wins during the 1969-70-71 seasons established an A.L. record for most victories in three consecutive seasons, surpassing the previous mark (313) set by the 1929-30-31 Philadelphia A's . . . Named "manager of the year" by A.P. in 1973.

His clubs have compiled 12-6 record in five American League championship series and were 10-0 until A's won second game of '73 ALCS . . . Managed A.L. all star team in 1970, 1971 and 1972 and was named honorary manager for the 1974 classic.

Served as first base coach for Orioles in first half of 1968 season, after spending 11 years honing skills as manager in Orioles farm system . . . Compiled an excellent record as his clubs won three pennants and finished second five times . . . Flag winners were at Appleton (1960) in the Three-I League, Elmira (1964) in the Eastern League and Rochester (1966) in the International League.

Since his first full season as a manager in 1957, Earl has finished in the first division 22 times in 24 tries (including five winter league teams) . . . From 1960 to the present, he has skippered 22 teams and finished either first or second with 20 of them.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class aaa to a levels . . . Until 1958 major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for aaa players) and \$2,000 (for class d players) . . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000.

However, in 1959, a first year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961 an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965 the first year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.

BITS ABOUT THE BIRDS

ORIOLES 1975 FINANCIAL STATEMENT: During the fiscal year ending October 31, 1975, the Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. (BBC) sustained a net loss of \$3,192. Only twice in the seven year history of divisional play (starting 1969) have the Orioles failed to qualify for post season play (1972 and 1975), and these have been the only two years in this period that the ballclub has not shown a profit.

In 1972 the loss was \$214,582; however, a draw of more than one million fans at home plus improved stadium rental terms contributed to keeping the 1975 loss at a modest level.

In 1974 the club earned \$82,700. Since the Orioles began operating in the American League in 1954, they have earned a profit in 17 of 22 years.

.300 HITTERS: In 22 seasons the Orioles have had only 14 qualifying .300 hitters (477 plate appearances from '54 thru '60 and 502 plate appearances since '61)—1956-Bob Nieman, .322 . . . 1957-Bob Boyd, .318 . . . 1959-Gene Woodling, .300 . . . 1961-Jim Gentile, .302 . . . 1962-Brooks Robinson, .303 . . . 1964-Brooks Robinson, .317 . . . 1966-Frank Robinson, .316 . . . 1967-Frank Robinson, .311 . . . 1969-Frank Robinson, .308 and Boog Powell, .304 . . . 1970-Frank Robinson, .306 . . . 1971-Merv Rettenmund, .318 . . . 1973 Tommy Davis, .306 . . . 1975-Ken Singleton, .300.

100 RBI MEN: The Orioles did not produce a 100 rbi hitter during their first seven Baltimore seasons ('54 thru '60). In 1961 Jim Gentile broke the barrier with gusto while accumulating 141 rbi, still a club record. Since then three Orioles have accounted for seven 100 rbi performances—Boog Powell (three times), Brooks and Frank Robinson (twice each)—1964-Brooks, 118 . . . 1966-Frank, 122; Boog, 109 and Brooks, 100 . . . 1969-Boog, 121 and Frank, 100 . . . 1970-Boog, 114.

No Oriole has driven in 100 runs since 1970 (for last five years) though Lee May only missed by one in 1975, finishing the season with 99.

* * *

STOLEN BASES: Until 1973 the Orioles had never stolen as many as 100 bases in a season. The highest previous figure was 97 in 1963 and Luis Aparicio stole 40 of them . . . In 1973 the Orioles led the league with 146, then swiped 145 in 1974 and 104 last year . . . In 1973 the Birds became the first team ever to have eight players with 10 or more steals in a season . . . Paul Blair now ranks second in club history with 152 stolen bases behind Luis Aparicio (166) . . . Don Baylor has led the club in steals in each of the past four years.

* * *

ORIOLES WINNING STREAKS: The longest regular season win streak in club history is 14 set in 1973 from Aug. 12 thru 27 . . . When it started the O's were second, 1½ games behind. When it ended they led the division by five games.

In three of Baltimore's division winning seasons, the Birds staged long win streaks at the very end of the season: in 1970 they won their last 11 then extended the string to 17 in post-season by sweeping the Twins in the ALCS and winning the first three games of the World Series vs. Cincinnati . . . in 1971 they again won the last 11 regular games, won three in a row from the A's in the ALCS and the first two WS encounters vs. Pittsburgh before the Pirates stopped the string at 16 . . . in 1974 the O's took their last nine in a row and then made it 10 straight with a win over the A's in the ALCS opener.

The Orioles, in addition to the nine game end of season string in 1974, also won 10 straight from Aug. 29 thru Sept. 7. During the final six weeks of that campaign, flanked by these two long streaks, the Birds enjoyed their longest sustained success in club history. On Aug. 28, they were 63-65, in second place, eight games behind Boston. From that point on, they won 28 (15 by one-run), lost only six and won the division title by two games over the Yankees (who won 27 of their last 38). The Red Sox in the meantime had dropped to third, seven games back.

BITS ABOUT THE BIRDS

PITCHERS' WINNING STREAKS: Dave McNally has a corner on winning streaks by Orioles pitchers. The lefthander who had a total of 181 wins for the Birds from 1962 thru 1974 tied two American League records in 1969 (set originally by Johnny Allen in 1937 with Cleveland)—17 straight victories (Sept. 22, 1968 thru July 30, 1969) and 15 wins in a row at the start of a season. Over a period of just over one full season, from July 11, 1968 thru July 30, 1969, McNally compiled a 29-2 record, a string which started with 12 straight wins. Later, in 1971, he put together a 13 game victory streak.

Two other Orioles have also won 12 straight—Moe Drabowsky (1966-67) and Pat Dobson (1971). Jim Palmer (1969) and Mike Cuellar (1971) have each won 11 in a row for the Birds while Palmer (1973) also had a 10 game streak as have Hoyt Wilhelm (1958-59) and Wes Stock (1962-63-64).

MAJOR LEAGUE RECORD VS. ROYALS: The first time the Orioles ever played the expansionist Kansas City Royals was on May 9, 1969 and Dick Drago went the route for K.C. to beat Dick Hall in relief, 4-2. The Royals didn't defeat the Birds again until April 30, 1971 after Baltimore had reeled off a major league record 23 straight wins at the expense of the young K.C. franchise.

THE BIRDS AND THE BROWNS: The Baltimore Orioles were charter members of the American League when it began operation in 1901. However, after two seasons the club was moved to New York where it ultimately became known as the New York Yankees.

The franchise from which the current Orioles descend came into the A.L. in 1901 representing Milwaukee, but in 1902 was transferred to St. Louis and named the Browns. In 52 seasons (1902 thru 1953) the Browns were, perhaps, the most unsuccessful team in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465 (.433) and finished in the second division 40 times. They won their only pennant in 1944 then lost the world series in six games to their home town rivals, the Cardinals.

In June, 1951, Bill and Charles DeWitt sold their controlling interest to Bill Veeck who operated the club for the next 2½ seasons. On September 29, 1953, he sold his shares to a group of Baltimore businessmen who brought major league baseball back to this city after a 51-year lapse.

BALTIMORE'S HALL OF FAMERS: Robin Roberts recently gained the distinction of becoming the first former American League Oriole of the present day era to achieve election to baseball's prestigious Hall of Fame. Roberts who accumulated 286 victories in 19 major league seasons and once won 20 or more for six straight years ('50 thru '55) for the Phillies was 42-36 for the Birds from 1962 thru 1965.

Roberts joins a distinguished list of 10 other players from earlier periods in Baltimore professional baseball history. Among these are seven who helped the National League Orioles to three straight pennants in the mid '90s: John McGraw (inf), Wilbert Robinson (c), Hughie Jennings (ss), Dan Brothers (1b), Willie Keeler (of), Joe Kelley (of) and Joe McGinnity (p).

Catcher Roger Bresnahan played for the American League Orioles in '01 and '02 in the early stages of his major league career (McGraw, Robinson, Kelley and McGinnity had remained here and were teammates of Bresnahan during the city's brief early tour in the A.L.).

During Baltimore's 52 years in the minors from '03 thru '53, two of the game's greatest players—Babe Ruth and Lefty Grove—toiled for Jack Dunn's International League Birds.

MAGIC NUMBER

To calculate: Determine number of games to be played by first place club . . . Add 1 . . . Subtract the number of games first place club is ahead of second place club in the all-important lost column (A.I.L.C.). The result represents the magic number . . . Example: If first team has 20 games to play and is six games ahead of second team . . . $20 + 1 = 21$. . . $21 - 6 = 15$. . . 15 is the magic number.

When, in any combination, first team wins added to second team losses equal the magic number, first team has clinched the championship . . . From another angle—with each subsequent first team win or second team loss, the magic number is decreased by one . . . When the "M.N." is down to one, first team has clinched a tie, when it is reduced to zero, first team has won the title.

★ ★ ★ SPRING TRAINING NOTES

This is the 18th straight spring the Orioles have trained in Miami. Over the past 17 years some 750,000 fans have watched the Birds in exhibition games at Miami Stadium.

The permanent seating capacity at Miami Stadium is 9,548, but the Orioles and Yankees drew a standing room crowd of 12,464 for a Sunday afternoon game on March 14, 1965.

Last year the Orioles were 18-9 in spring training, their best record since 1969 (19-5). The Birds were 8-6 vs. A.L. opponents and 10-3 against N.L. teams including 8-1 vs. the Atlanta Braves.

Don Baylor was the club's leading hitter with a .438 average (32-for-73) and also paced the Birds in homers (8) and rbi (18). Other top hitters were: Ellie Hendricks (.394, 13-for-33), Al Bumbry (.354, 23-for-65) and Ken Singleton (.324, 22-for-68). Lee May finished second to Baylor in homers (4, all in the last week of spring training) and rbi (16).

Jim Palmer was 4-0 in six starts with a 2.38 era and Mike Cuellar was 3-1 despite an era of 7.59.
