**NOTES:** In addition to 51 regular season telecasts, one Orioles pre-season game will also be televised—Friday, March 20 vs. Los Angeles Dodgers at Miami Stadium (8:00 P.M.).

The television schedule tentatively includes the opening day game in Cleveland on Tuesday, April 7th . . . Eight Friday night games, 11 Saturday and nine Sunday games, plus 23 weekday or weeknight games.

Four other television stations in the Orioles' drawing area will pick up some of these telecasts: WBOC (Ch. 16, Salisbury), WTPA (Ch. 27, Harrisburg), WYLB (Ch. 15, Lebanon), WSBA (Ch. 43, York).

Aside from WBAL in Baltimore, the Orioles radio play-by-play network will comprise some 60 stations scattered over 10 states: Maryland, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida.

For the first time since the Orioles began training there in 1959, Orioles' regular season games will be regularly broadcast into the Miami area. WGBS radio (710) will carry approximately 150 of the Orioles 1970 regular season games plus all weekend exhibitions in spring training.

**FARM NOTES:** In 1969, for the eighth consecutive year, the Orioles farm system finished over ".500" with a composite won-lost record of 368-316 (.538) . . . Since 1961, the overall record of Orioles farm clubs is 3,666-3,363 (.522), tops among all big league organizations.

The Miami Marlins and Stockton Ports both won league championships in 1969. Miami captured the Florida State League's eastern division title, then defeated Orlando (Minn. Twins), the western division winners, in a best of five series for the league crown . . . Stockton won the California League's first half, then finished second in the last half of the season to Visalia (N.Y. Mets). In the post-season playoffs the Ports defeated Visalia, two games to one. They ended the 1969 season with an overall record of 81-59.

Rochester finished fifth in the International League with a record of 71-69 while Dallas-Ft. Worth was second in the Texas League with a 75-58 mark.

Aberdeen, in its 25th consecutive year of affiliation with the Orioles and their predecessors, the St. Louis Browns, placed fifth in the Northern League (28-32) . . . The Bluefield Orioles wound up second in the all-rookie Appalachian League with a 33-36 record.

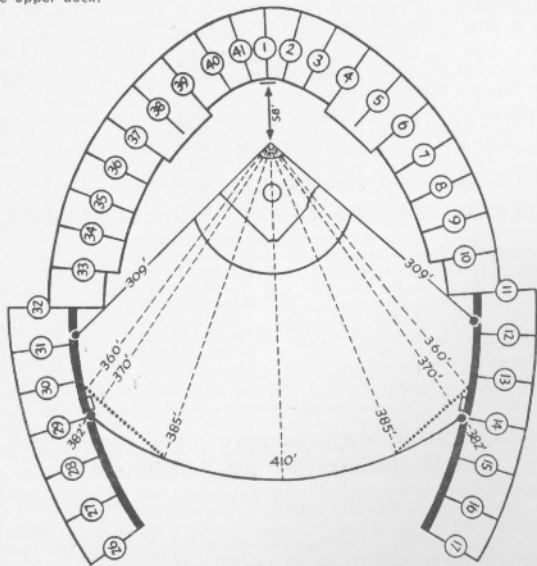

## 1969 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

**BOSTON:** The Orioles captured the series for the season from the Red Sox, 10-8 . . . The O's won 6 of 9 games at home but only 4 of 9 in Fenway Park.

**Hit Parade:** The Orioles lost the opener of a 4-game series against the Red Sox April 14-17 at Fenway Park, then swept the next three games with an avalanche of hits and runs . . . In the three games, the O's hit .414 as a team (48-for-116) with 6 doubles, a triple and 6 home runs while winning by scores of 10-5, 11-8 and 9-5.

**Top Draw:** Boston was the best drawing club at Memorial Stadium during the 1969 season, both in total gate and average per date . . . In 8 dates with the Red Sox, the O's drew 154,066—an average of 19,258 per date.

**Robby's Club:** Frank Robinson led the Orioles in hitting against the Red Sox with a .369 average (24-for-65) and 5 home runs . . . In four seasons with the Orioles, he has socked Boston pitching for a .333 mark (70-for-210), with 21 home runs and 48 runs batted in.

**CALIFORNIA:** The Angels were the only club the Orioles did not have a winning margin against in 1969 . . . The two each had 3-3 records at home and on the road against one another, to finish the season at a standoff, 6-6.

**Power:** The O's used the long ball to beat the Angels, 4-3, in 11 innings at Anaheim Stadium June 1 . . . Boog Powell's 9th-inning home run tied the game at 3-3 and Paul Blair won it with a solo blast two innings later . . . Earlier, Don Buford had hit one for the O's.

**Perfect:** Marcelino Lopez pitched 5.1 perfect innings in relief to gain an 11-4 win over the Angels June 10 . . . The O's scored all their runs in the first three innings, but starter Tom Phoebus was struggling despite the lead and was replaced by Lopez after giving up four runs in the 4th.

**A Pair:** Curt Motton belted a pair of home runs to lead the Orioles to a 10-0 win at Anaheim Stadium August 19.

**Players:** No less than 39 players got into the game as the Angels won, 7-5, in 14 innings June 11 at Memorial Stadium . . . The Angels used 22 players, including 7 pitchers.

**CHICAGO:** The Orioles took the season's series from the White Sox, 9-3 . . . The Chisox won the first two games, May 6-7, before the O's ran up 9 wins in a row . . . Chicago ended the streak by winning the final encounter, 10-3 on September 2.

**Hits Everywhere:** The Orioles as a club had a great year against the White Sox, compiling a .334 team average . . . The O's were 142-for-425 with 18 home runs and 78 RBI's in 12 games . . . In three different games, the Orioles had at least 18 hits against the White Sox: 20 on July 27; 19 on June 14 and 18 in the June 15 nightcap of a twin-bill.

**Powell's Production:** Boog Powell had a tremendously productive year against the White Sox as he hit .459 with 17-for-37 while belting 8 home runs and driving in 14 runs.

**Record Setter:** When the O's wrapped the White Sox, 17-0, on July 27, it was a record for the widest margin of victory in the club's history . . . Jim Hardin pitched a two-hitter that day and chipped in with a 3-run homer while running his career record to 6-1 vs. Chicago . . . The O's set a couple of other club records in the game—total bases (39) and the most runs ever scored at Memorial Stadium.

**CLEVELAND:** The Orioles had a 13-5 margin over the Indians in victories for the year . . . The O's were far more successful at home against the Indians, winning 8 of 9, than they were in Cleveland, where they won 5 of 9.

**Clincher:** The Orioles clinched the Eastern Division title September 13 with a 10-5 victory over the Indians.

**Instant Replay:** Pete Richert picked up successive victories July 16-17 against Cleveland, thanks to Brooks Robinson . . . Robby's bases-loaded single in the 9th drove in the deciding run in the twin-bill nightcap July 16th, then he clouted a 2-run homer in the 9th inning the following night to give Richert and the O's another victory . . . The losing pitcher in both games was Stan Williams.

**Busy Tom:** Tom Phoebus started 6 times during the year against the Tribe, winning three and losing three.

**Luckless:** The Orioles beat Stan Williams five times without losing to him . . . Only two other pitchers ever lost 5 times in a season to the O's—Ned Garver with the 1957 A's and Dick Stigman of the 1963 Twins.

**DETROIT:** The Orioles were 11-7 vs. the Tigers, posting a 6-3 mark at Memorial Stadium and 5-4 at Tiger Stadium.

**Triple Blast:** Successive home runs by Frank Robinson, Boog Powell and Brooks Robinson averted defeat and were instrumental in a 5-4 win over the Tigers September 4 . . . The O's trailed 4-1 going into the 9th inning when the eruption took place . . . The winning run scored on Mark Belanger's ground out.

**Moon Shot:** Boog Powell joined a very select group July 6 when he slammed a home run that sailed over the right field roof at Tiger Stadium . . . He hit the home run off Dennis McLain.

**Mark's Game:** Mark Belanger accounted for all three Oriole runs when the O's beat the Tigers, 3-2, in 10 innings April 23 at Memorial Stadium . . . He hit a two-run homer in second to tie game at 2-2, then singled home the winning run . . . Denny McLain and Mike Cuellar both went the distance and pitched great ball . . . McLain at one point retired 21 Orioles in succession while Cuellar set down the last 20 Tigers in a row and did not allow a hit after the second inning.

**Dave's Mark:** Lefty Dave McNally posted a 4-1 record against the Tigers to improve his lifetime mark to 15-7 against them.

**Extra Innings:** Four Baltimore-Detroit games went into extra innings . . . The two clubs played 14 innings September 7; 11 innings September 6 and 10 innings April 23 and October 1 . . . The O's won all but the 11-inning game.

**KANSAS CITY:** The Orioles lost the first game they ever played against the Royals, then roared back with 11 consecutive wins to take the series for the year by a lop-sided margin . . . The O's were 5-1 at home and 6-0 on the road against the Royals.

**Triple Play:** The Orioles executed a triple-play around-the-horn while beating the Royals, 2-1, on August 6 . . . With Ed Kirkpatrick on second and Joe Foy on first, Ellie Rodriguez hit a ground ball to third . . . Brooks Robinson stepped on third to force Kirkpatrick, threw to Dave Johnson at second for out No. 2 and Johnson's relay to Boog Powell at first nailed Rodriguez for the final out.

**27 Straight:** Jim Palmer pitched the equivalent of a perfect game against the Royals when he retired 27 consecutive batters in two successive starts . . . In the May 11 game, he set down the last 11 in order, then retired the first 17 in a row in his next start May 17.

**Jim's Win:** Jim Hardin provided his own margin of victory in the May 10 game at Memorial Stadium with a home run in the bottom of the 9th inning that gave the O's a 6-5 victory . . . Hardin got the win while making his first relief appearance since July 15, 1967—a period covering 54 straight starts . . . He hit the homer off former Oriole reliever ace Moe Drabowsky, his stockbroker.

**MINNESOTA:** The Orioles defeated the Twins 8 times in 12 games during 1969, winning 5 of 6 at Baltimore and breaking even in 6 games at Minnesota.

**Good Guy Blair:** Paul Blair was the offensive and defensive hero in a 9-8 triumph over the Twins May 14 at Minnesota . . . He belted two home runs and drove in 5 runs and made a fantastic catch against the left-centerfield fence on a drive by Rod Carew in the 9th inning with the tie run on first base . . . Blair hit .353 (18-for-51) for the year against the Twins with 7 home runs.

**Bad Guy Tovar:** One person—Cesar Tovar—prevented Dave McNally and Mike Cuellar from pitching no-hitters against the Twins . . . In both games, Tovar broke up the gems with 9th inning singles . . . Against McNally, he singled with one out in the 9th inning of the May 15 game and against Cuellar he singled leading off the 9th in the August 10 game . . . Those were the only hits the Twins got in the two games . . . Cuellar had retired 35 batters in succession before Tovar singled, including the last 11 he faced against Kansas City in his preceding start, August 6.

**Strike-Breaker:** Rich Reese put an explosive end to Dave McNally's record-matching 17-game winning streak August 3 at Metropolitan Stadium . . . Appearing as a pinch-hitter with the bases loaded in the

7th inning, Reese slammed a 3-2 pitch into the left field stands to pace the Twins . . . All three dismissals against the Twins happened at Metropolitan Stadium: May 13, Ed Runge; August 2, Bill Haller, and August 22, Frank Umont.

**Three Outs:** Oriole Manager Earl Weaver was ejected four times during the regular season and three times when the O's were playing the Twins . . . All three dismissals against the Twins happened at Metropolitan Stadium: May 13, Ed Runge; August 2, Bill Haller, and August 22, Frank Umont.

**Rare Homer:** Paul Blair hit an inside-the-park home run against the Twins August 8 at Memorial Stadium . . . It was the 11th in Oriole history and 6th at Memorial Stadium, but the first at home since May 19, 1959 when Billy O'Dell hit one against Chicago.

**NEW YORK:** The Orioles beat the Yankees 11 times in 18 games during 1969 but saw an end to their string of successes at Yankee Stadium . . . The O's were 7-2 vs. the Yanks at home but only 4-5 at Yankee Stadium, where all 5 setbacks came in succession starting July 1 . . . The Orioles had beaten the Yankees 38 times in 47 games at Yankee Stadium dating back to July 16, 1964 . . . In the past 5 seasons, the Orioles have played .722 ball against New York with 65 wins and 25 losses . . . Since 1954, when the Orioles returned to the American League, they have compiled a 157-159 mark against the Yankees.

**Big Days:** Boog Powell clouted two home runs and drove in 7 runs against the Yankees July 1 at Yankee Stadium . . . In a doubleheader April 27 at Memorial Stadium, Frank Robinson had 6 hits (including two home runs) and 8 runs batted in to pace an Oriole sweep of the twin-bill.

**Biggest Inning:** The Orioles enjoyed the biggest single inning in their 16-year history against New York in the first game of a July 8 doubleheader at Memorial Stadium . . . Going into the 4th inning, with the game scoreless, the O's exploded for 9 hits and 10 runs and went on to win easily, 10-3 . . . The hit and run totals were club marks and there was a third record established in the inning—7 successive hits.

**Alone:** In the nightcap of the July 8 doubleheader, Mike Cuellar pitched a perfect game—except for Ron Woods . . . Cuellar won the game, 4-1, and pitched a three-hitter . . . Woods, a .183 hitter for the year, got all three hits—a home and two singles—as he was the on'y Yankee to reach base.

**OAKLAND:** The Orioles won twice as many (8-4) as they lost against the A's in 1969 . . . The Orioles were 5-1 at home and 3-3 at the Oakland Coliseum.

**No-Hitter:** Jim Palmer, just four days after he came off the disabled list, pitched a no-hitter against the A's August 13 at Memorial Stadium . . . He walked 6 but struck out 8 while pitching the only gem of the year in the American League . . . It was the 3rd no-hitter in three years by Oriole hurlers.

**Longest Game:** Ted Kubiak, who had been 0-for-8 in the game, singled home the winning run to give the A's a 9-8 win in the 18th inning of a twin-bill nightcap at Oakland August 24 . . . The game lasted 5 hours and 8 minutes and was the longest of the year for the O's.

**Bat Day Gate:** The O's biggest home crowd of the year, 39,860, turned out on Bat Day, May 25, and saw the Orioles beat the A's, 5-3 . . . A record 28,960 tickets were sold at the gate that day.

**Pinch Blast:** Curt Molton, ace pinch-hitter, belted a pinch home run in the 10th inning to give the Orioles a 4-3 victory over the A's August 22 at Oakland.

**SEATTLE:** The Orioles were 9-3 against the Pilots in the first year of action between the two clubs . . . At home the Orioles won four of 6 games while in Seattle the O's had a 5-1 edge.

**Wrong Card:** Oriole Manager Earl Weaver caught Seattle pilot Joe Schultz with his cards mixed May 28 at Seattle . . . The Seattle skipper made out a second line-up card after Weaver decided to pitch Dave McNally instead of Jim Palmer . . . However, Schultz handed Weaver the first card at the pre-game meeting at the plate . . . Mike Cuellar caught the mistake because he could not spell Gerry McNertney's name . . . Cuellar was in the dugout writing down the line-up as it was given over the public address system when he encountered difficulty with

## SUMMARY OF 1969 SEASON

The Orioles were all alone in first place in the Eastern Division for practically the entire 1969 season . . . The O's moved into first place on April 16 and remained there the rest of the season, winning the divisional crown by 19 games.

The month of June provided the springboard that separated the Orioles from their Eastern Division opponents . . . The O's went into June with a three-game lead and came out with an 11-game margin as they compiled a 21-6 record during the month . . . Winning streaks characterized the O's throughout the season—there were 12 consisting of at least four games—and one of the big ones was a 7-game streak June 13-19 . . . There was also a 5-game streak in the first week of June . . .

At the All-Star break, July 21-23, the Orioles were cruising along with a 65-31 record and were 11 games ahead of second place Boston . . . The O's continued to build the lead until it reached its zenith of 22 games on September 25 . . . A letdown over the last week of play dropped the final margin to 19 games—the biggest winning gap since Joe McCarthy's 1936 Yankees won by an all-time record of 19½ games.

Clinching day of the divisional title was Saturday, September 13 . . . The O's were not involved in the act itself as second place Detroit lost to Washington in the afternoon and was eliminated . . . Nevertheless, they went out that night and beat Cleveland to hammer an extra nail in the lid.

The O's moved into the American League's first championship series against Minnesota, winner of the Western Division . . . The Orioles took the best-of-5 set in three straight games, winning the first two in taut, extra innings contests and then wrapping up the series with an easy conquest in Game No. 3. The whole world knows what happened to the Birds at the next plateau.

**FIELDING NOTES:** Orioles were first in team fielding for the fourth time in last seven seasons (1966, 1964, 1963). Their .984 percentage was the highest since the Birds set the league record of .985 in 1965—Their 101 errors were the lowest total since they set mark of 95 also in '64 . . . Four Orioles won "Gold Glove" awards by vote of other A.L. players: Brooks Robinson (10th straight), Paul Blair (his 2nd), Mark Belanger and Dave Johnson . . .

Brooks tied for the lead in fielding at 3rd with Ken McMullen . . . It was the 9th time (in 10 years) he has led in percentage. He also paced the loop's third basemen in assists for the seventh time, a league record . . . Elrod Hendricks led A.L. catchers with a .998 percentage.

Paul Blair easily led league outfielders in chances (426). Del Unser (Wash.) was a distant second with 357 chances.

The Orioles executed one of only two triple plays in the American League in 1969. It was a rare "round-the-horn" ground ball type—on a bounce to third by Kansas City catcher, Eliseo Rodriguez. Brooks fielded it, stepped on third then threw to second baseman Johnson who relayed to Powell for the third out . . . It was the first triple play pulled off by the Orioles since 1959 and only the third in the club's 16 year history.



## ITEMS OF INTEREST

**MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES:** This award is presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland, based on a vote taken by the announcers and writers who travel with the club . . . Winners have been: Chuck Diering (1954), Dave Philley (1955), Bob Nieman (1956), Billy Gardner (1957), Gus Triandos (1958), Gene Woodling (1959), Brooks Robinson (1960), Jim Gentile (1961), Brooks Robinson (1962), Stu Miller (1963), Brooks Robinson (1964), Stu Miller (1965), Frank Robinson (1966), Frank Robinson (1967), Dave McNally (1968), Boog Powell (1969).

**SHRINE OF IMMORTALS:** The Shrine, jointly sponsored by the Orioles and Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association, was created in 1960 to recognize men with Maryland backgrounds who have distinguished themselves in professional baseball . . . To qualify, a candidate must either be a native of Maryland or have been a player or official of the Orioles, International or American League, for a minimum of three years . . . One new member is added each year by vote of the MPBPA, providing a candidate receives sufficient support.

There are presently 19 members in the Shrine: Frank (Home Run) Baker, Jack Bentley, Max Bishop, Joe Boley, Jack Dunn Sr., Jimmy Foxx, Lefty Grove, Buck Herzog, Merwin Jacobson, Charlie Keller, Fritz Maisel, Bill Nicholson, Johnny Neun, Babe Phelps, Dick Porter, Jack Ogden, Eddie Rommel, Babe Ruth and Tommy Thomas.

**1969 FINANCIAL STATEMENT:** The consolidated operations of the Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. and its wholly owned subsidiary, the Baltimore Bays of the North American Soccer League, showed a net income in fiscal 1969 of \$232,237.99. Without the financial losses sustained by the Bays whose operation was terminated on September 30th (1969), the net profit would have been approximately \$90,000 higher.

Both the Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. and the Baltimore Orioles Inc. (the holding company which owns approximately 76% of the B.B.C.I. stock) declared dividends for the third time in 16 years . . . Baseball Club Inc. paid out 75¢ per share and Orioles Inc. 55¢ on January 9, 1970 to stockholders of record December 26, 1969.

## ITEMS OF INTEREST

**THE 1960'S:** Over the last decade (beginning 1960) the Orioles have won more games (and lost less) than any other club in the American League . . . In that ten year period the O's are 911-698 and have finished in the first division eight times while winning two pennants. In the same span the New York Yankees rank second (887-720), Detroit third (882-729) and Minnesota fourth (including Senators of '60, 862-747).

The club the Orioles have beaten most in the 60's was the team with the league's second best record, the Yankees against whom the Birds were 111-73 . . . Only one opponent held a winning record over the O's in the decade . . . That was the Tigers who were 94-90 vs. Baltimore . . . The Birds' ten year record against the others: Boston (105-79), California (from '61, 83-72), Chicago (95-83), Cleveland (99-85), Minnesota (incl. Wash. in '60, 91-87), Oakland-K. C. (107-69) and Washington (from '61, 110-52).

**LAST SIX YEARS:** During the last six seasons the Orioles have put together the best won-lost record in the major leagues, i.e. 1964 thru 1969 (564-405) . . . In second place is San Francisco (547-424) followed by Detroit (546-426), St. Louis (541-429) and Minnesota (537-435).

**HOME GROWN:** Twenty-five of the 41 players on the Orioles roster were originally signed and then developed in the Birds' farm system: Adamson, Arnold, Baylor, Beene, Belanger, Bertaina, Crowley, Etchebarren, Floyd, Freed, Grich, Herson, Johnson, Kennedy, Leonhard, Martin, McNally, Montague, Oates, Palmer, Phoebus, Powell, Rettenmund, B. Robinson and Watt.

In addition, four others on the list were originally signed by other clubs but were developed to a large extent in the Orioles' organization . . . Paul Blair, Dave May, Curt Motton and Al Severinsen were all drafted by the Orioles after just one pro season.

Another current Oriole drafted from another club at the minor league level was Jim Hardin (from the Mets) but he spent four seasons with Met farm clubs and only one and one-half with the Baltimore system before being elevated to the parent club.

**ORIOLES ROSTER—RANDOM FACTS:** The average Oriole is 26½ years old, weighs 185 pounds and is 6' tall . . . The heaviest player is Boog Powell at 250 while three infielders (Enzo Hernandez, Stan Martin and Chico Salmon) are tied with a low weight of 150 . . . Dick Hall is both the oldest (39) and tallest (6'6½") while Junior Kennedy is the youngest (19) and Curt Motton the shortest (5'7½").

Brooks Robinson has the highest seniority rating on the Orioles having worn a Baltimore uniform for all or part of the past 15 seasons, but Frank Robinson has the longest string of unbroken major league service 14 years . . . There are 12 righthanded pitchers and five left-handers . . . Among non-pitchers righthanded batters also out-number the lefties, 15-7, and there are two switch-hitters (Buford and Martin).

**FRED HOFMANN MEMORIAL AWARD:** Don McShane, one of the Orioles' top scouts for the past 15 years, was the 1969 recipient of the Hofmann Memorial Trophy given annually in memory of the long-time Oriole scout and major league catcher who died in 1964 at the age of 70 . . . The award is presented annually to a member of the Baltimore scouting or minor league departments for "distinguished service and dedication to his profession."

McShane, 62, is the Orioles' Far West Scouting Supervisor operating out of San Francisco. In that assignment he is responsible for a nine state area. McShane has been in professional baseball for 43 years since starting as a shortstop in Corsicana, Texas in 1926.

Previous winners: Barney Lutz (1965), Walter Youse (1966), Earl Weaver (1967) and Jim Russo (1968).

**BARNEY LUTZ PLAYER AWARD:** The Orioles established this award in 1968 to honor Barney Lutz, an Oriole scout who died suddenly in 1966. It is given to a player in the Orioles' minor league system in recognition of his aggressiveness, competitive spirit, hustle and dedication to professional baseball." Last year's winner was pitcher Fred Beene. Infielder Billy Scripture (Rochester) received the first Lutz award in 1968.

## RULES OF INTEREST

**FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE—A BRIEF SUMMARY:** Major League and National Association clubs meet twice a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent . . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

Approximate dates of draft meetings: Summer (June 10) and Winter (mid-January) . . .

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) **Regular Phase**—selection of free agents in inverse order of major league standings . . . Limitations on number of selections by each organization at each level: Major League (1), "AAA" (1), "AA" (1), "A" (unlimited) . . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) **Special Phase**—selection of free agents who had been drafted at a previous meeting, but who were not subsequently signed before the negotiation right expired . . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with express written consent of that player . . . Order of selection in the special phase is determined by lot.

**SUSPENDED GAME RULE:** A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4½ to 5 innings) . . .

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8 . . .

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969. Formerly, the game would have been declared a tie and replayed in its entirety at a later date.

**BALTIMORE CURFEW:** Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13) —Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

Sunday Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.7—No Sunday game at Baltimore may start before 2:00 P.M.

**BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION:** 502 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings.

**ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS:** To qualify as a Rookie a player may not have spent more than 45 days on a big league roster between cut-down dates (the 31st day of season and Sept. 1), AND may not have exceeded 90 official at bats or 45 innings pitched at major league level.

**"SAVE" RULE (10:20):** (a) Credit a save to a relief pitcher who enters a game with his team in the lead if he holds the lead the remainder of the game, providing he is not credited with the victory.

(b) A relief pitcher cannot be credited with a save if he does not finish the game, unless he is removed for a pinchhitter or pinchrunner.

(c) When more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save under the provisions of this rule, credit the save to the relief pitcher judged by the scorer to have been most effective. Only one save can be credited in a game.

The first American League Championship Series game ever ended in sensational fashion . . . With two out and Mark Belanger on third, Paul Blair who was 0-for-4 on the day, 0-for-12 overall and only 13-for-85 in his last 20 games, dropped a perfect bunt down the third base line off Perranoski. Before Twins catcher John Roseboro could pick up the ball the game was over. Belanger had crossed the plate and Blair had passed first base. It was a wild, completely unexpected ending to a very exciting ball game that had produced four home runs, yet was decided by a base hit that traveled only 22 feet.

Boog Powell made it all possible. The Orioles MVP led off the 9th with the Birds down by 3-2 and promptly tied it with a home run off Perry, the third he had yielded that day (he had averaged only 1 home run ball every 14 innings during the season) . . . When Brooks Robinson followed immediately with a single and went to second after Ted Uhlaender muffed the ball in left, it looked like the Orioles would win it right there. Manager Martin pulled Perry and brought on Ron Perranoski, the league's leading reliever (40 points, 9 wins and 31 saves) to pitch to lefthander Elrod Hendricks . . . Earl Weaver countered with Curt Motton, a righthander. Curt popped up on the right side, but Rod Carew muffed the routine chance.

Then Perranoski picked up two outs and the inning ended with Brooks being thrown out returning to third after an abortive double steal attempt.

The tension thickened with every passing inning. Cuellar had come out after the 8th for a pinch-hitter and Pete Richert put the Twins down in the 9th. Eddie Watt came on after the Birds had tied it and retired all six batters in the 10th and 11th. The Birds went down in order in the tenth, then singles by Powell and Brooks (his fourth of the day) with one down in the 11th produced another threat but again the Birds didn't score. In the Twins 12th Marcelino Lopez came in to pitch. He walked Killebrew, retired Oliva, gave up a single to Uhlaender with Killebrew going to second, then wild pitched the runners into scoring position before issuing an intentional pass to load the bases. At that point 39-year old Dick Hall replaced Lopez, struck out Leo Cardenas then got Roseboro on a fly to left to end the inning.

The Orioles had jumped out to early leads twice. Frank Robinson's home run off the left field foul pole in the 4th made it 1-0, but the Twins tied it on Bob Allison's sacrifice fly in the 5th after a double by Tony Oliva and an error by Frank Robinson which moved the Cuban outfielder around to third base.

Mark Belanger's solo shot in the bottom of the 5th gave the O's a 2-1 edge, but in the 7th Oliva hit a two run blast off Cuellar following a walk to Killebrew to put the Twins on top 3-2 which is where it stood until Powell's blast in the 9th.

The first hit of this first ALCS game was delivered fittingly enough by the league's leading hitter, Rod Carew. Brooks Robinson was the first to break the ice for the Birds with a single in the second.

The Orioles' first hitter of the game, Don Buford, put the Birds ahead 1-0 with a home run just over the auxiliary fence in right off Tom Seaver . . . In the fourth inning, the Orioles scored three more to pad their lead to 4-0 . . . With two out and none on Elrod Hendricks singled and Dave Johnson walked . . . Mark Belanger singled, scoring Hendricks, then Mike Cuellar blooped a hit to center and Johnson checked in. Finally Buford delivered his second hit of the game, a double, to score Belanger.

After that the Birds had only one baserunner—Blair on a walk in the 7th—off Seaver, who left after five, and his successors, Don Cardwell and Ron Taylor.

Cuellar, meanwhile, yielded only two hits (single to Cleon Jones in 1st and double to Donn Clendenon in 4th, both with two out) and two walks thru the first six innings.

In the seventh the Mets mustered their only major threat . . . Clendenon opened with a single and Swoboda walked . . . After Cuellar retired Ed Charles, Jerry Grote singled to load the bases . . . Al Weis followed with a sacrifice fly scoring Clendenon . . . Then Rod Gaspar batting for Cardwell, chopped a slow bouncer trickling toward third . . . Brooks rushed in, made a fine barehanded pickup and throw to nip Gaspar at first to end the inning.

Cuellar gave up a single in the 8th and a hit and walk in the 9th but put both fires out without further trouble.

Lefthander Jerry Koosman held the Orioles hitless thru the first six innings allowing just one runner (Johnson on a walk in 2nd) . . . In the meantime Clendenon's 4th inning homer off McNally had staked him to a 1-0 lead.

In the 7th, however, the Birds tied it when Blair, leading off the inning, broke Koosman's hitless string with a sharp safety to left. He then stole second and scored two outs later on Brooks' base hit to center. Johnson made a bid to keep the rally alive with a hard shot to the left side but Charles at third made a fine stop to his left and forced Brooks for the final out.

McNally, who had allowed only 3 hits in 8 innings, came into the 9th with a 1-1 tie, and quickly retired Clendenon and Swoboda . . . However, Charles singled and Grote and Weis followed with successive base hits to left, the latter scoring Charles from third to put the Mets up 2-1 . . .

Koosman got Buford and Blair to open the 9th but then walked Frank and Powell . . . At that point Ron Taylor was called in by Manager Hodges and the veteran righthander forced Brooks to bounce out to third to end the game.

This was Tommy Agee's day . . . The Mets centerfielder homered leading off for the Mets in the first inning, then made two great catches that deprived the Orioles of at least five runs . . . With the Mets ahead

3-0 in the fourth the Birds had Frank on third and Powell on first via singles with two out . . . Hendricks then slashed a drive to deep left center that appeared to be good for a double and two rbi before Agee reached it at the last instant and made a great backhanded catch after a long run to the fence . . .

In the Orioles' seventh the Mets led 4-0 . . . Koosman retired Hendricks and Johnson on flies to Agee, then lost his touch, walked three straight and left in favor of speedballer Nolan Ryan . . . Blair with a 2-strike count sent a shot into right center, and Agee, going the other way this time, reached it after another long run, caught it low, then slid across the grass on his belly, but held on to the ball . . . Considering that the fleet Buford was the runner on first (with 2 out) there is little question that three runs would have scored if Agee had not made the play.

The Orioles loaded them up again in the 9th on two walks and a pinch-single by Clay Dalrymple, but again all had started with two down and Ryan then got Blair on a game ending called strike.

Plate Umpire Shag Crawford made history of sorts in game No. 4 and so did Ron Swoboda . . . The Mets were ahead 1-0 on Clendenon's second homer of the series when Mark Belanger led off the Orioles' third . . . Crawford called time and moved deliberately toward the Oriole dugout, stopped, pointed a warning finger then shouted something in that direction . . . As Crawford returned to his position, Manager Weaver walked out to the plate to discuss the situation and Crawford waved him out of the game . . . It was only the third time in series history that a manager had been ejected and the first such incident since 1935 . . . Belanger followed with a single and so did Cuellar but the O's could not score.

Swoboda's magnificent contribution to world series lore occurred ironically on the play that enabled the Birds to score their only run of the game . . . Seaver had held the Orioles to three hits over 8 innings and still led 1-0 into the 9th . . . With one out, however, Frank singled, and went to third on Boog's base hit to right. Brooks then lined a shot to right field that appeared headed into the slot. At very worst the Birds figured to have the tying run in and men on second and third, but Swoboda made a miraculous headlong back-handed diving catch inches off the grass that must rank among the best of all the great world series defensive plays.

Frank scored from third on the sacrifice fly to tie the score but that was all the scoring the Birds could muster. Ed Watt, who came on in the 8th after Cuellar's removal for a pinch-hitter, gave up a pair of singles in the ninth but got out of the jam and forced the game into extra innings.

The Mets actually made an error in the 10th (by Wayne Garrett at third on Johnson's bouncer) and a subsequent one out single by Dalrymple (his second pinch-hit) plus a fly to right moved Johnson to third, but then Seaver threw a third strike past Blair.

Dick Hall took the mound for the Birds in the 10th and yielded a lead off double to Grote . . . Weiss was intentionally passed. Pete Richert then relieved Hall to face switch hitter J. C. Martin, batting for Seaver. Martin dropped a bunt down the first base line; Richert fielded it, but his throw hit Martin in the back and as the ball rolled toward right field, Gaspar (running for Grote) scored the winning run all the way from second.

Photographs showed clearly that Martin was running out of the three foot lane during that last 45 foot stretch to first when the ball hit him. This represents offensive interference but plate umpire Crawford did not see it that way.

The Orioles jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the third when Dave McNally hit a two run homer off Koosman after Belanger's single, then later in the inning Frank hit another home run with none on . . . After that it was all downhill, albeit gradually.

The Birds still led 3-0 in the sixth with one out when Frank appeared to have been hit on the thigh with a Koosman pitch . . . Plate umpire Lou DiMuro, however, ruled that the ball had hit Frank's bat first and did not allow him to take first base, touching off a substantial argument and a delay while Frank went into the dugout for first aid (subsequent films showed that the pitch had indeed hit Frank first) . . . Koosman then struck him out.

In the bottom of the inning, Cleon Jones claimed he was hit on the foot by McNally but DiMuro said no . . . until Manager Gil Hodges ran out of the dugout some moments later with a ball bearing a shoe polish stain (presumably the same one McNally had thrown on the previous pitch) . . . DiMuro then relented and sent Jones to first (movies also indicated that Jones had been hit as he claimed). When Clendenon followed with his third homer of the series, the score was 3-2.

Light hitting Al Weis then hit his first homer ever in Shea Stadium (his third overall for the year) to tie the score in the 7th . . .

The Mets won the game and the series in the 8th with Eddie Watt, who came in to pitch that inning, the victim . . . Jones opened the frame with a double. Clendenon bounced out to Brooks but then Swoboda followed with a double scoring Jones. Charles flied out but when Powell fumbled Grote's bouncer and Watt dropped his late throw to first, Swoboda scored all the way from second.

## 1966 WORLD SERIES REVIEW

The Baltimore Orioles have been involved in one other World Series since returning to the American League in 1954. That was in 1966 when the Birds swept four straight from the Los Angeles Dodgers to become World Champions. Here is a review of that Series:

### Game No. 1—Orioles 5-9-0, Dodgers 2-3-0

A brilliant relief pitching effort by Moe Drabowsky and first inning home runs by Frank and Brooks Robinson carried the Orioles to victory at Dodger Stadium. With one out in the first inning, Dodger starter Don Drysdale walked Russ Snyder and Frank Robinson immediately followed with a home run to left. Brooks Robinson was the next batter and he also homered to left to give the Orioles a quick 3-0 lead. Oriole starter Dave McNally, working on a 4-2 lead in the third inning, ran into control problems and was replaced by Drabowsky. Working the remaining 6-2/3 innings, Drabowsky allowed only one hit and set a Series record by fanning 11. He tied another record with 6 straight strikeouts in the fourth and fifth innings.

### Game No. 2—Orioles 6-8-0, Dodgers 0-4-6

Jim Palmer, 9 days short of his 21st birthday, became the youngest pitcher in World Series history to toss a shutout as the Orioles moved 2-up in the Series. A shoddy Dodger defense that committed 6 errors (including three in one inning by centerfielder Willie Davis) aided the Oriole victory, but the day belonged to Palmer. The strong-armed right-hander struck out 6 and walked three as he stopped the Dodgers cold. The Orioles broke a scoreless deadlock in the fifth inning with three tallies, mainly because Davis dropped two fly balls and was charged with a throwing error. The Orioles added another run in the sixth and two more in the eighth to wrap up the game. The losing pitcher was the incomparable Sandy Koufax, appearing in his final game with the Dodgers. Dave Johnson, with a sixth inning single, earned the distinction of getting the final hit off Koufax.

### Game No. 3—Orioles 1-3-0, Dodgers 0-6-0

The Orioles extended their Series lead to three games as Paul Blair and Wally Bunker teamed up to give the Orioles the win at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium. Blair belted a 430-foot home run to left-center in the fifth inning to account for the game's only run while Bunker, bothered much of the year by a sore right elbow, fanned 6 and walked only one. Fine defensive plays by leftfielder Curt Blefary and shortstop Luis Aparicio eased Bunker's path to victory. Dodger southpaw Claude Osteen, who suffered the loss, pitched very well as he gave up just three hits and a walk in the seven innings he worked.

### Game No. 4—Orioles 1-4-0, Dodgers 0-4-0

The Orioles became World Champions by defeating the Dodgers in four straight as Dave McNally's arm and Frank Robinson's bat brought the Series to an end. McNally, who started the first game and failed to last through the third inning, was brilliant as he retired the Dodgers in order in seven of the nine frames. Robinson, who homered in the first inning of the first game off Don Drysdale, did it again in this game when he unloaded a fourth inning shot deep into the left field seats. The blow not only won the game but earned him the Series MVP award. McNally's pitching stretched to 33 the number of consecutive innings in which the Dodgers were held scoreless. Two great plays by the centerfielders highlighted the defensive phase of the game. In the fourth frame, Willie Davis leaped high against the centerfield fence and snared a drive off Boog Powell's bat that was over the top of the barrier. In the eighth inning, Blair, who entered the game as a defensive replacement at the start of the inning, ran to the fence in leftcenter and jumped to make a great catch on a ball hit by Jim Lefebvre that appeared to be a home run.

**NOTES:** The Orioles handled 141 chances in the Series without committing an error . . . Boog Powell was the only player in the Series to hit safely in all four games and paced the hitters with a .357 mark (5-for-14) . . . Orioles' shares as winners amounted to \$11,683.04 while the Dodgers each got \$8,189.35 as losers . . . Orioles voted 34 full shares . . . Orioles used only 13 players in the Series . . . Attendance for the four games was 220,791; 1st game, 55,941; 2nd game, 55,947; 3rd game, 54,445; 4th game, 54,458 . . . Among the more noteworthy records: the 33 consecutive scoreless innings hurled by Oriole pitchers; Drabowsky's 11 strikeouts in relief in 1st game; Willie Davis' three errors in the 5th inning of the second game, which tied the existing mark; Drabowsky's 6 straight strikeouts in the 1st game, which also tied a record; the largest gate receipts for a game (\$557,384 for Game No. 2).

### EARL WEAVER

**Born: Aug. 14, '30; 5'8"; 165; Batted, R; Threw, R.**

Born in St. Louis, Mo., now makes home in Baltimore . . . Managed Orioles to American League pennant in 1969 in first full year as skipper . . . O's have compiled 157-87 record (.643 percentage) under him in one and a half seasons . . . Named manager July 11, 1968, succeeding Hank Bauer . . . Took over when club was third, finished season in second place as team played .585 ball (48-34) the remainder of year . . . Served as first base coach for American League in 1969 Major League All-Star game . . . Will manage A.L. stars in 1970 game . . . Finished third in voting for A.L. Manager of the Year award in 1969 . . . Ted Williams and Billy Martin got more votes.

Ejected four times during the regular season and once in the World Series . . . National League umpire Shag Crawford tossed him out of fourth Series game . . . First time in 34 years and only third time in Series history a manager had been ejected from a Series game . . . Frank Chance, of the 1910 Cubs, and Charlie Grimm, of the 1935 Cubs, were the other two.

Served as first base coach for Orioles in first half of 1968 season . . . Excellent record as minor league manager in Oriole farm system for 11 seasons . . . He won pennants at Appleton in Three-I League (1960), Elmira in the Eastern League (1964) and Rochester in the International League (1966) . . . His clubs finished second five times and in 1967 his Rochester team finished in a tie for the pennant but lost a one-game playoff to Richmond for the flag.

Broke into pro ball in 1948 as infielder in Cardinals' chain . . . Signed to first contract by Walter Shannon, present scouting director for Orioles . . . Played on pennant-winning teams in each of his first four years . . . Primarily a second baseman . . . Led leagues in fielding in all but two seasons during playing career . . . Most Valuable Player in three different leagues: West Frankfort, Illinois State League (1948), St. Joseph, Western Association (1949) and Omaha, Western League (1951) . . . Named to five all-star teams during career . . . Went to spring training with the Cardinals in 1952 . . . Got start as manager with Knoxville (Sally League) in 1956 when he ran club for last several weeks of the season.

Managed Santurce in Puerto Rican League during winters of 1966-67 and 1967-68 . . . Won post-season playoffs the first year and the pennant the second year . . . Graduate of Beaumont High School in St. Louis . . . He and his wife, Marianna, live in the Perry Hall section of Baltimore.

### GEORGE BAMBERGER

**Born: Aug. 1, '25; 6'0"; 190; Batted, R; Threw, R.**

Born in Staten Island, N. Y., still lives there . . . In third year as Oriole pitching coach . . . Served as minor pitching instructor for four years with O's before being named pitching coach October 3, 1967 . . . Playing career covered 18 seasons, including 15 at Triple-A level . . . Retired as player after 1963 season.

Originally signed by New York Giants . . . Appeared briefly with Giants in 1951 and 1952 and the Orioles in 1959 . . . Made 10 major league appearances but was not involved in any decisions . . . Won 213 games in minors . . . Hurlled no-hitter for Ottawa against Toronto in International League in 1951, winning 1-0 . . . McNertney's name . . . He asked Weaver for the Seattle card and noticed the difference, which he pointed out to Weaver . . . The Orioles jumped out in front quickly and were leading 9-2 in the 5th inning when Weaver sprung the surprise . . . Tommy Davis had just doubled home two runs for the Pilots when Weaver notified the umpires that Davis batted out of turn, according to the card Weaver had . . . The umpires agreed, ruled Davis out and declared the runs void . . . The O's went on to win, 9-5.

**Satisfaction:** Chico Salmon, obtained from Seattle a week before the season opened; had one of the best games of his career August 16 against the Pilots . . . He went 4-4 with two home runs and 6 RBI's to lead the Orioles to a 15-3 win.

**Unusual One:** Of Boog Powell's 202 career homers with the Orioles, the most unusual was hit August 16 off a former teammate, Steve Barber . . . It was an inside-the-park blow in Seattle's friendly Sicks' Stadium . . . Powell hit the ball to right-center field and it bounded away from the fielders as it came off the fence . . . Powell rounded the bases and beat the relay to the plate . . . The homer was the 12th of its kind in Oriole history and second in 8 days . . . Paul Blair had hit one August 8 against Minnesota.

**WASHINGTON:** The Orioles compiled a 13-5 record against the Senators, going 7-2 at home and 6-3 on the road . . . The Orioles have posted a 110-52 record (.679) vs. expansion Washington teams dating back to 1961.

**Blanks:** Oriole pitchers racked up 39 consecutive scoreless innings in blanking the Senators in four of their first five meetings of the year . . . Frank Howard ended the string with a 2-run homer.

**Most HR's:** The Orioles hit 21 home runs against Washington in 1969, more than they hit against any other team.

**Success:** Dave McNally was spectacular against the Senators . . . He beat them four times without losing and allowed only three earned runs in 41 innings . . . He fired a two-hitter against them June 19 at R. F. K. Stadium, when President Nixon showed up for the last few innings.

**Streaks Snapped:** When the Senators beat the Orioles, 3-2, on September 15, it brought two winning streaks to an end . . . The O's had won 8 straight (their longest of the year) and Jim Palmer suffered his first defeat after 11 consecutive victories.

**LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM:** The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left center field . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by "Boog" Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

### SPRING TRAINING NOTES

The Orioles return to Miami Stadium for the 12th straight year . . . Last year the Orioles played to 33,210 in 13 dates in Miami to raise the total "home" attendance for 11 training seasons to nearly one-half million (495,094) . . .

The permanent seating capacity at Miami Stadium is 9,548, but the Orioles and Yankees drew 12,464, including standing room, for a Sunday afternoon game on March 14, 1965 . . .

The Orioles last year compiled the best spring training record among all major league clubs with a 19-5 mark . . . They were 11-2 in Miami Stadium, 12-2 vs. the American League and 7-3 vs. the National League. Individually last spring Frank Robinson led the club in hitting (.345, 19-for-55) and home runs (5) while Boog Powell paced the team in rbi with 15. Among the pitchers both Jim Palmer and Dave McNally were 4-0 and Mike Cuellar was 3-1.

Here are some Orioles spring training records for the period from 1954, Baltimore's first in the American League, through 1969: Hitting—Don Lenhardt (.462, 22-for-52) in 1954, and Al Pilarcik (.435, 40-for-92) in 1958 . . . Home Runs—8, Tito Francona (1956) and Frank Robinson (1966) . . . Runs Batted In—25, Tito Francona (1956) and Gus Triandos (1959).
